There will be no premature celebrations in Los Angeles this year. The Dodgers have learned their lesson.

Anybody else might be digging the corkscrew into the champagne. The Dodgers are keeping their bottles on ice.

Los Angeles clinched at least a tie for the National league pennant Sunday when the St. Louis Cardinals lost to the Cincinnati Reds, 5-2. The Dodgers could have clinched the flag by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates,

against the New York Yankees. Still there was little joy in the Los Angeles dressing room Sunday.

"You never celebrate a tie," explained pitcher Don Drysdale. This was a distinct turnaround from last year's reaction after the Dodgers had clinched a tie with two days remaining in the season. They held an impromptu celebration and then lost their final two games and the playoffs.

The Dodgers will play their last six games at home starting but instead dropped a 4-0 decision. The outlook is as bright as a World Series share for the Dodgers, who need win just one of their final six games to qualify for what probably will be the richest Series ever.

Bob Veale held the Dodgers to two hits until the ninth inning, but needed help from Elroy Face after walking two men. Jim Gilliam beat out a punt to load the bases before Face got Tommy Davis and Frank Howard on pop flies to end the game.

Cincinnati got three unearned runs in the third inning as the result of an error by Julian Javier and the Cardinals were unable to catch up against the six-hit pitching of Joe Nuxhall (14-8). Vada Pinson recorded his 200th hit of the season for the Reds, a two-run triple.

Willie McCovey blasted three consecutive home runs off three different pitchers to give him the league lead in homers for the Giants, who collected 18 hits.

Bob Buhl went all the way for his 11th victory and helped his own cause by driving in three runs for the Braves.

The Colts rallied for both their runs in the ninth inning, the second coming home on rookie Joe Morgan's first major league hit.

The American Football league seems to be acquiring balance in the fourth year of its existence.

After three weeks of the new season, only one team — the San Diego Chargers — today could claim a perfect record. And Sid Gillman's men could find next Sunday when they entertain the defending champion Kansas City Chiefs.

Three AFL games were played Sunday — and all produced upsets.

The Boston Patriots knocked off the previously unbeaten Oakland Raiders, 20-14; the New York Jets surprised the Houston Oilers, 24-17, and the Chiefs were erased from the perfect record list when they were held to a 27-27 standoff by the Buffalo Bills. San Diego and Denver were idle.

The Patriots took over undisputed possession of first place in the Eastern Division with a 2-1 record while the Oilers (1-2), the East's perennial champs, skidded to third. San Diego (2-0) topped the Western Division.

OSU Beavers Rally To Beat Utah 29-14

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — "That's the kind of a team we may be this year," Oregon State football Coach Tommy Prothro offered.

He spoke after the Beavers exploded for four touchdowns in a seven-minute span to come from behind and defeat Utah 29-14 here Saturday night.

A crowd of 17,381 watched the opening season intersectional game.

Pascual Captures 20th AL Triumph

One thing Camilo Pascual of the Minnesota Twins never expected to be called — by friend or foe — is a model of consistency.

The story of the 29-year-old Cuban right-hander's major league career is one of big talent hampered by a high-strung temperament. But today Camilo is indeed a good example of consistency — the only 20-game winner of 1962 to repeat in 1963.

Those who reached the 20-mark in 1962 but who won't make it this year include Ralph Terry, Dick Donovan and Ray Herbert in the American league and Don Drysdale, Jack Sanford, Bob Purkey and Joey Jay in the National.

Pascual, 29-11 in 1962, raised his 1963 record to 20-9 Sunday when he pitched the Twins to a 6-1 triumph over the Boston Red Sox. Pascual struck out nine to lift his season mark to 193 — seven short of his third straight season with 200 or more strikeouts.

Killebrew Homers
Red-hot Harmon Killebrew hit his fifth homer in three games and his 45th of the season and Jim Hall and George Banks also homered for the Twins. Minnesota's club total of 224 homers is second in major league history only to the 240 hit by the 1961 New York Yankees.

The New York Yankees nipped the Kansas City A's, 4-3, the Chicago White Sox edged the Detroit Tigers, 3-2, the Cleveland Indians whipped the Los

Angeles Angels, 5-3 and 2-1, and the Washington Senators beat the Baltimore Orioles, 4-2, after a 6-3 loss in other American league games.

Al Downing scattered nine hits and struck out six to score his 13th win for the Yankees, whose seven-hit attack included a two-run homer by Joe Pepitone.

The Green Bay Packers proved they can win the 'big' game without Paul Hornung, but the New York Giants showed that without Y. A. Tittle they're nothing.

The Packers demonstrated the class of champions Sunday against the club they had to beat, drubbing the Detroit Lions, 31-10.

But the Giants, with Tittle morosely pacing the sidelines because of a chest injury, were clobbered by the Pittsburgh Steelers, 31-0.

Two of the National Football league's old stars, one Johnny-come-lately, and one young man with great promise also proved a few points on the second week end of the season.

Jimmy Brown showed further that he thrives under the Cleveland Browns' new regime when he broke loose for two long runs in a 41-24 rout of the Dallas Cowboys.

Old Clutch-Touch
Johnny Unitas showed his old clutch-touch when he engineered a 10-point last-period surge that earned the Baltimore Colts a 21-14 triumph over the San Francisco Forty Niners.

Billy Wade, who knocked around the league for several seasons before winning a steady job with the Chicago Bears two years ago, pitched three touchdowns passes in a 26-7 win over the Minnesota Vikings.

And 24-year-old Charlie Johnson, undoubtedly the brightest young quarterback prospect in the NFL, also threw three scoring passes in leading the St. Louis Cardinals to a come-from-behind 29-24 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles.

Saturday night on the West Coast, the Washington Redskins trounced the Los Angeles Rams, 37-14.

Thus, after two weeks of play, there are only three perfect-record (2-0) teams in the NFL — Cleveland, Chicago and St. Louis.

Said coach Vince Lombardi of his Packers' impressive win over Detroit: "We had played so badly in losing to the Bears last week we had to improve."

Said coach George Wilson of the Lions: "It just wasn't our day."

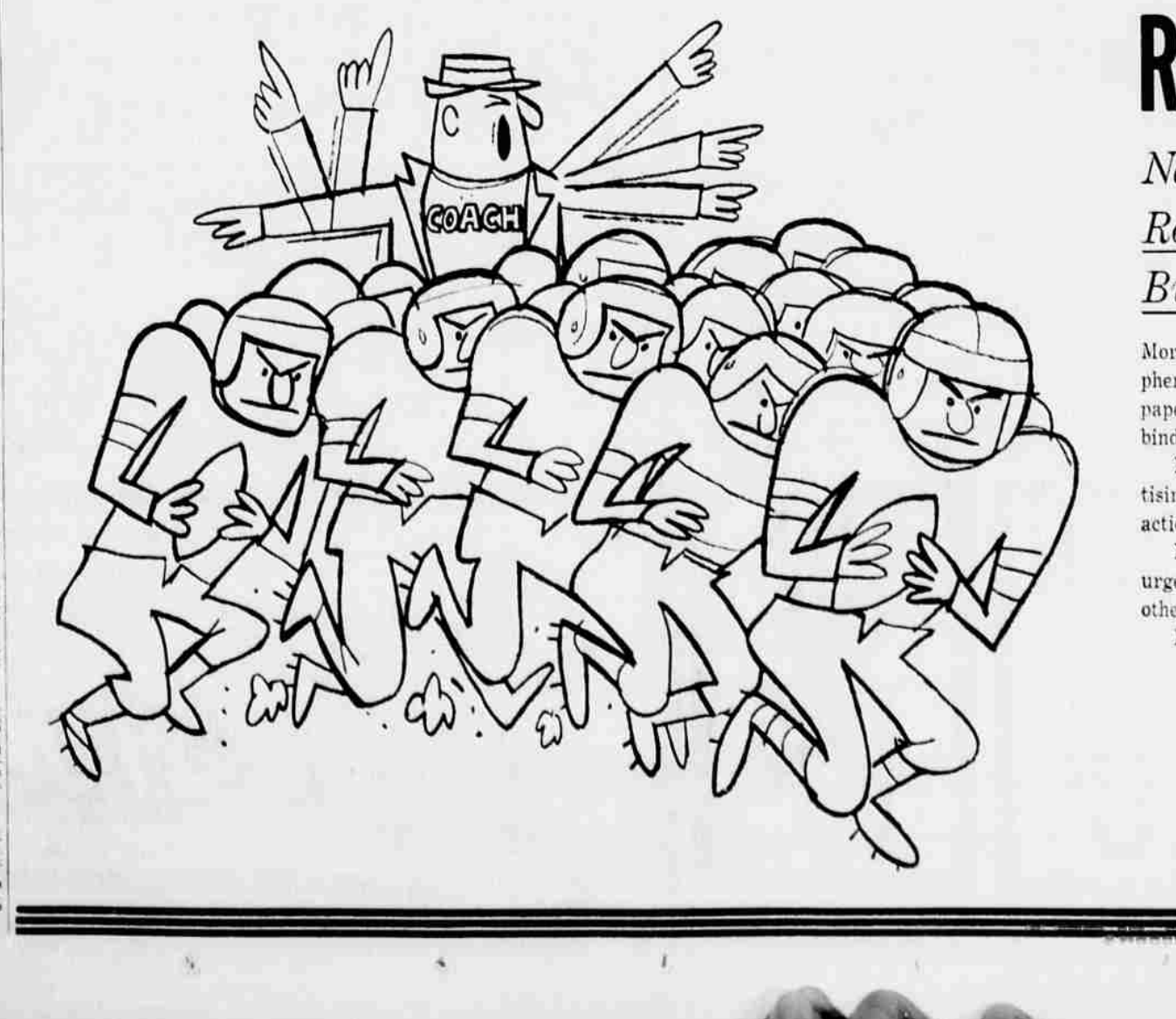
