Salad in Honor of Irish Lady Said To Taste Bad, Look Awful

By DICK WEST WASHINGTON (UPI) — Your chances of achieving everlasting fame by creating a new tossed salad are roughly comparable to your chances of winning the Irish Sweepstakes. These odds apply, of course, to professional salad tossers. The odds are a little better if you are a horse.

Efficient acclaim to warrant enshrinement in a recipe book. Nevertheless, the hope springs eternal in the salad bowl, and so the quest for human chef immortality continues hard apace. Just this week I attended a dress rehearsal for a new tossed salad that will have its world premier in Boston next month. I decided to witness the event because it was the first time I had heard of a salad being tried out on the road before making its formal debut. This salad has impressive credentials. It was created by the Waldorf system, which already has one hit salad to its credit. And it was named in honor of Mrs. Sean Lemass, wife of the

prime minister of Ireland. The official presentation of "Salad Lemass" will take place at a luncheon in Boston Oct. 18 on the occasion of the prime minister's visit to that city. William C. Waugh, chairman of the luncheon committee, arranged for it to be given a trial run here with Thomas Kiernan, the Irish ambassador, as the ranking taster.

Kiernan was asked if he would care for a dram or two of Irish spirits to pep up the taste buds before sampling the salad. "I'm a connoisseur of water," the ambassador replied. "The basic ingredients of 'Salad Lemass' are multi-shades of greens, beets, cucumbers and chopped eggs. They are tossed with a mixture of French dressing and cocktail sauce.

The Boston critics will, of course, arrive at their own judgments, but I must say the reviews at its out-of-town tryout were not entirely encouraging. "It tastes bad and it looks awful!" was one appraisal I heard.

Its appearance possibly could be improved by tossing in a few old sweepstakes tickets, but Mrs. Lemass, I fear, will never become a Caesar, salad-wise.

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'Soft' Detergents Will Aid Against Water Pollution

NEW YORK (UPI)—One of the processes used today to ensure less foaming detergents once they are discharged into disposal systems aged on a shelf for four years before it went to work.

And its developers believe that it may go back to work in another chemical area some time.

The hubbub over actual or potential pollution of water supplies through the use of high-foaming detergents—those which do not break down readily through normal bacterial action in sewage disposal plants or in nature—has occupied the attention of private business and public officials for years.

Headway has been made in the campaign to develop "soft" detergents, which will aid in the campaign against water pollution.

Earlier this year, Continental Oil company outlined plans to build two multi-million dollar plants, one at Lake Charles, La., and one at Baltimore, to make the chemicals, from petroleum, suitable for use in "soft" detergents.

Union Carbide also has made announcement of plans to help along the supply of "digestible" detergents.

At Universal Oil Products Co., developer of one of the processes for making chemicals for detergents that can be destroyed by bacteria in sewage disposal plants, a spokesman recalled recently that the process, which the company called Melex, was brought along originally to remove long-octane material from gasoline.

UOP knew the process had other uses, but it remained shelved because the development of the compact or small car market reduced the drive for high-octane gasoline. There was an over-expansion of oil refining capacity, and less call for refiners to install new processes for making gasoline.

Now Uses Sought. Then the process came back to the attention of oil refiners and detergent manufacturers in the demand for a solution to the water pollution problem, Continental and Geiselman Benzol, a West German firm, signed license agreements.

A spokesman for Universal said here recently that Maynard P. Venema, chairman of the board at Universal, believes the same process can lead to the production of other chemicals, for non-detergent use, and that it can go to work in producing improved gasolines and jet fuels.

He pointed out past experimentation in the petrochemical field often has led to products far removed from the object of the original search. It is well known in the petroleum industry that chemists, in looking for a way to keep gum from forming in gasoline, found two other useful products. One protects tires or other rubber products, and one keeps rancidity from fats and oils for human consumption.

TOKYO (UPI)—More than 1,200 Japanese were stricken with food poisoning Saturday after eating box lunches prepared by a cooking school.

It was the worst case of mass food poisoning here since the end of World War II. The lunches were sold at 30 restaurants around the city. Police said there were no deaths.

Health department technicians blamed the poisoning on tainted tuna or whale meat. The cooking school, Shokuryo Gakkai, announced that it will close down its sideline restaurant operations.
