

# Phoenix Pirates Lead in A-2 Poll

PORTLAND (UPI) — North Salem took over first place among Oregon's A-1 high school football teams in the Journal coaches' poll today, with Medford dropping to sixth. North Salem had 70 of a possible 80 points.

Medford suffered a 25-0 loss to Boise last Friday night.

North Salem, which tied with Grants Pass, was followed in order by Jefferson,

Roseburg, Grants Pass, Pendleton, Medford, Central Catholic, Grant, Cottage Grove and West Linn and Parkrose tied for 10th. South Salem was the only other A-1 school getting votes.

In class A-2 Phoenix held the lead followed in order by Seaside, Vale, Brookings, Yamhill-Carlton, Bandon, Central Douglas, North Catholic and Stiuslaw.

## Fanfare

Fear not. All is not lost. Opportunities for a fine—even great—season still lie ahead on the football scene for the Medford high Black Tornado, despite the sting of a stunning loss at Boise, Idaho.

And, without doubt there's plenty of grim determination in the Tornado camp as it gears for its return to the challenge of Oregon competition.

**NO EASY PICKINGS**  
It won't be easy pickings for the Whirlwind this week as it bids to get back on its victory trail. For, the Medfords go against North Salem Vikings, who have been moved into the No. 1 Class A-1 ranking accorded to Medford a week ago.

North's Vikings will carry into action more than just an incentive to uphold top rating. Friday's game at Salem will match the Class A-1 championship finalists of 1962. Medford's grid efforts garnered the stadium by beating the bigger North aggregation 14 to 0 last November.

Because of the rematch between champ and runnerup, Friday's tangle rates as one of the big non-league struggles of the Oregon prep season.

**TICKETS AVAILABLE**  
Ralph Hale, in charge of athletic ticket sales at Medford high, has reported that persons planning to attend the conflict in the capital city may purchase tickets at his office. Only general admission tickets are being sold but a section for Medford adult fans and student rooters is being reserved behind the Black Tornado bench. Tickets sell for \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. A total of 150 to 200 tickets reportedly have been sent to Medford.

**MUCH EVIDENCE**  
North will take on the Wind after a non-loop verdict of 26 to 6 over South Salem and a tie of 19-all with Grants Pass of the Southern Oregon conference. And, there's plenty of evidence that the 1963 version of the Vikings will be tough for Medford. One report we've had is that Grants Pass was lucky to hold North Salem to a tie.

**FINEST LINE**  
We didn't write it down the other night when Larry Stevens of the GP coaching staff spoke to us. But his remark was something like this: "You can say that Spike Hillstrom (coach of North Salem) has the finest high school line I've seen."

Along with the line the Vikes have a one-two running attack in Del Schaeffer and Rod Allison and a capable passer in Jeff Lankow. Lenny Martin is also a runner who can break away.

Hillstrom reportedly has a big fast and tough defensive squad known as "Wright's Raiders." Pre-season indications from Salem were that the Vikes don't have the massive belt that Medford's lighter, quicker team overcame last year. But, there's evidence of some good beef around.

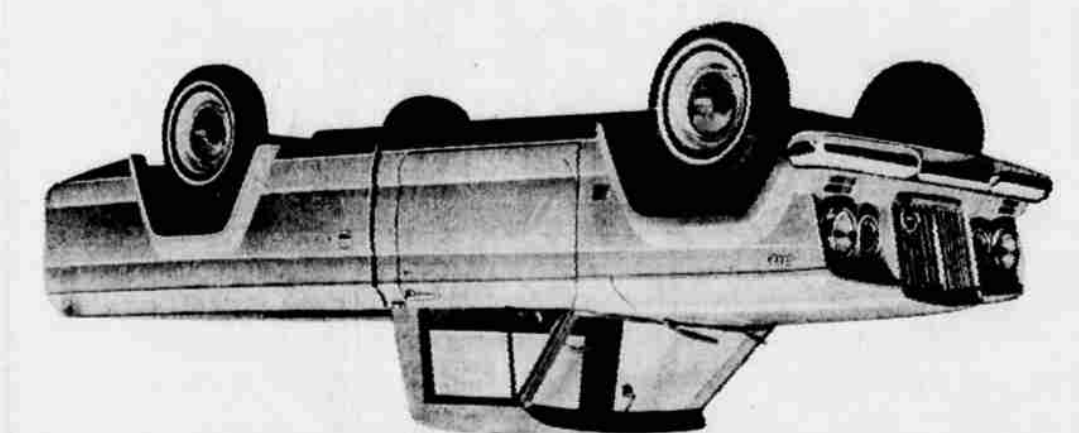
