

Rockefeller's Trip Raises Question of Vatican Protocol

Governor Has Audience Slated With Pope Paul

ROME (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, his six-nation European visit scarcely begun, today faced an embarrassing question by his divorce and remarriage.

The governor, who was to meet today with Italian political leaders, has an audience scheduled for Wednesday with Pope Paul VI, and Vatican sources made no secret of the fact that some consternation was felt over the appointment.

Felt 'Unusual'

The sources said Mrs. Rockefeller would not attend, but said some high Vatican prelates felt it was "unusual" for a man who had been divorced and remarried to be received in papal audience, since the Catholic church does not recognize divorce.

The problem brought a swift reaction from Robert McManus, press secretary to Rockefeller.

"The governor has a number of appointments with various people in Europe, including an audience with His Holiness," he said. "At none of these meetings will Mrs. Rockefeller accompany the governor."

"No significance should be attached to the fact that she is not going to accompany him to the Vatican."

Concern Reflected

McManus' statement reflected apparent concern in the Rockefeller ranks over the Vatican comments. The divorce and remarriage are highly sensitive topics in the governor's unannounced but evident drive for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

The Rockefeller party flew in Monday night from Paris. Today the governor's schedule included meetings with President Antonio Segni, Premier Giovanni Leone, Treasury Minister Emilio Colombo, Christian Democratic Party Secretary Aldo Moro, and Socialist Vice Secretary Francesco de Martino.

Price of Raw Sugar Increases Sharply

NEW YORK (UPI) — Housewives may have to pay more for sugar soon.

The price of raw sugar increased sharply Monday. The National Sugar Refining Co. immediately announced it was increasing the price of refined sugar 25 cents per 100 pounds, for both industrial and consumer packaged sugar.

Other refiners were expected to follow National's lead.

ECTOPIC PREGNANCY

Q. What is an ectopic pregnancy and how often does it occur?

A. Ectopic pregnancy refers to any pregnancy outside the uterine cavity. The majority of such pregnancies are located in the fallopian tubes (tubal pregnancy). Normally, the fertilized ovum traverses the tube and implants itself in the uterine wall. In tubal pregnancy the fertilized ovum attaches itself to the tube. The wall of the tube is thin and sooner or later the tube ruptures. The latest figures we have on the incidence of ectopic pregnancy come from New York City, where there were 34 ectopic pregnancies per 10,000 live births in 1957.

WHITISH "SLEEPERS"

Q. What causes the white discharge which collects at the corners of the eyes?

A. White secretions which accumulate at the corners of the eyes are mucous and eyelid secretions, together with dust and other debris cleared away by the eyelid movements. A moderate amount of whitish material isn't cause for alarm.

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Pope Orders On News of 'Greater Liberty' Ecumenical Council

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI has ordered that "greater liberty" be used in giving out information on the secret sessions of the Ecumenical Council, it was announced today.

The second session of the council starts Sunday. Msgr. Fausto Vallino, head of the council's press office, said that because of the order "we will be able to give all the substance

of what the fathers say" in debate. The meetings will remain closed to the public, however. During the first session of the council the press office gave out a minimum of information on what was going on inside the council hall in St. Peter's Basilica.

The 2,500 prelates from around the world were under threat of excommunication if they revealed what was said and

done inside the hall. Despite this, almost everything that went on during the first council session was learned, although it did not come from any "official" Vatican source.

The announcement of information came as favorable worldwide response to the pontiff's plans to modernize the Roman Curia appeared to add new strength to liberal prelates at the council.

The pontiff's announcement last Saturday that he planned to reform the conservative Curia, making it more interna-

tional in recruiting and more modern in outlook, appears to have set the tone for the debate even before it starts.

The Curia, or central church administration in the Vatican, drew some sharp criticism last fall from council liberals. They felt the Curia was too stiff toward modern realities.

Pope Paul, in a speech to Curia members, said he planned to change outdated structures in the Curia and give it a more "ecumenical" spirit. In other words, as one source put it, a friendlier attitude toward

non-Catholics.

Pope Paul also indicated he was considering taking away some of the Curia's powers to leave decisions on some matters up to individual bishops.

In Warsaw, Stefan Cardinal Wyszynski of Poland said some Polish bishops failed to receive passports to attend the second session of the council.

"This decision of the authorities is unjust . . . It is a restriction of human rights and will leave the impression aboard that Poland is a sealed prison," he said Monday.

ANTI-FRANCO TERRORISTS SENTENCED

MADRID (UPI)—A military court sentenced two anti-Franco terrorists to prison terms totaling 55 years, government sources said here today.

The men, both Spaniards, were tried in Madrid Monday in connection with bombs which exploded in Avalecia, southern Spain, last December, and in Rome last March.

BEN BELLA THREATENS TO NATIONALIZE PROPERTY

ALGIERS (UPI)—Algerian Premier Ahmed Ben Bella threatened Monday to nationalize all remaining French property in the country if France resumes nuclear tests in the Sahara desert.

FERRIS WHEEL OWNER MUST STAND TRIAL

TIJUANA, Mexico (UPI) — The owner of a carnival ferris wheel that collapsed and killed four persons earlier this month must stand trial on manslaughter charges.

The court issued the ruling Monday and set bail at \$1,200 for Inocencio Garcia Paredes, 57, who has been held in the state penitentiary since the Sept. 15 tragedy.

ITALIAN SOCIALIST LEADER ARRIVES IN LONDON

LONDON (UPI)—Pietro Nenni, leader of the Italian Socialist party, arrived here Monday night for a two-day visit with "old friends."

He refused to say what he would discuss with British acquaintances, including opposition leader Harold Wilson.

JEWISH RELIGIOUS STUDENTS PLEAD INNOCENT

JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI)—A group of 101 Jewish religious students pleaded innocent Monday night to criminal trespass charges in connection with demonstrations against Christian missions in Israel.

Portland Woman Gagged, Robbed

PORTLAND (UPI) — A 63-year-old woman was bound and gagged in her home Monday night by two burglars who fled with \$600 they found in a radio after causing heavy damage.

Mrs. Ann N. Greenough said she came home from dinner at a restaurant and was grabbed by one of the men as she entered the house. He had a stocking over his face.

"The minute I came in, he grabbed me and put a pillowcase over my head. I managed to peek out a little and could see him on the floor counting the money," she said.

She said she was bound and gagged and shoved into a living room chair. She said the burglars overturned davenport, chairs, and ripped up rugs and pillows. They searched through all rooms, including the kitchen.

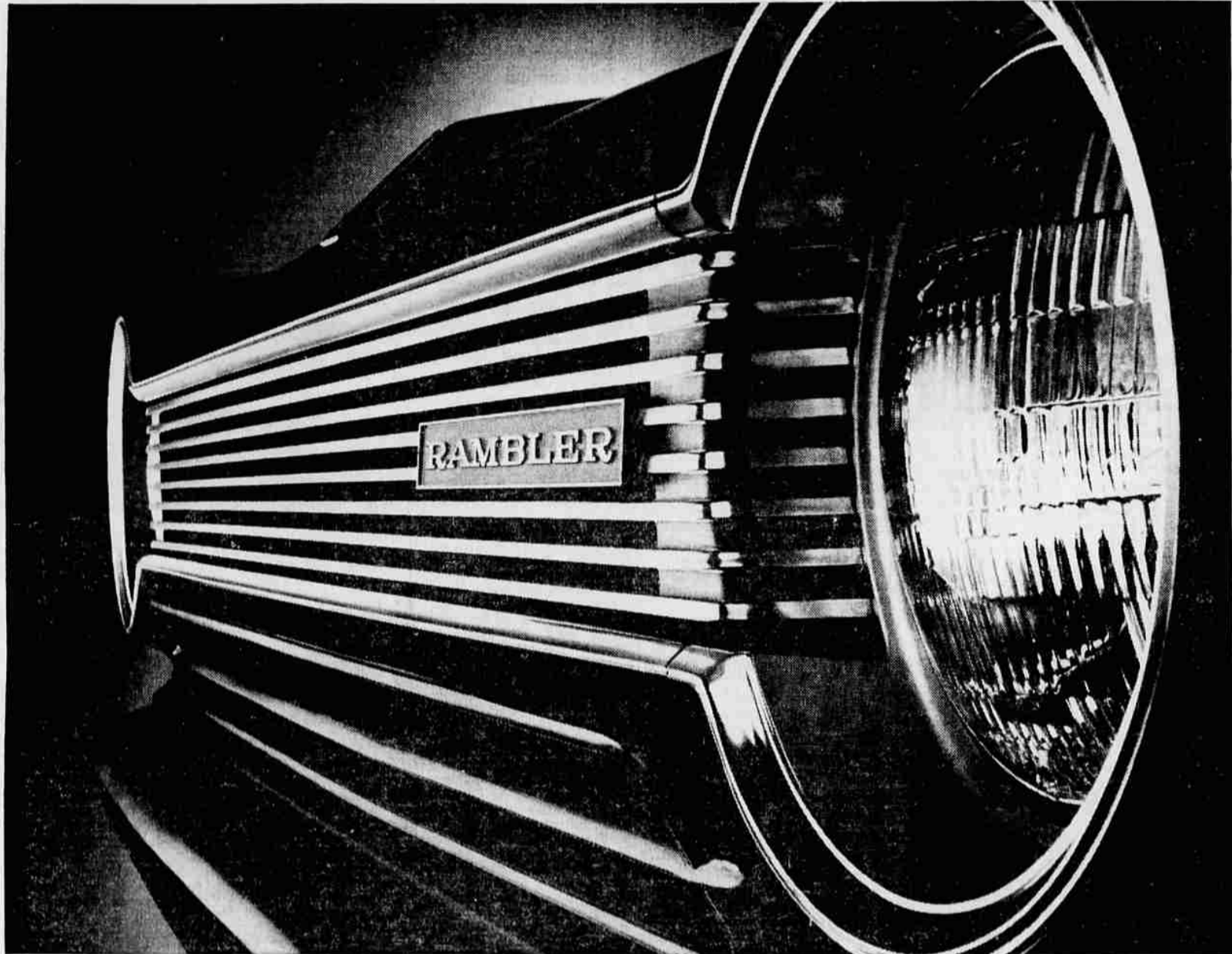
When they left they also took her cigarette lighter, and house and car keys. She finally worked free enough so she could telephone police.

New Castorbean Has High Yield

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UPI)—A new castorbean variety called "Lynn" has been landing high yields for farmers.

Texas A and M college said its agricultural experiment station and the U. S. department of agriculture developed Lynn under a cooperative research program. Developers of the new variety report yields on the Texas high plains have ranged from 2,200 to 2,400 pounds an acre in field trials. Lynn has also been a high yielder in Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska trials.
