Accused Stalls Trial for Murder

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI)—A young criminal attorney stalling the trial for the alleged "murder-for-hire" of his heavily insured wife Monday by asking to see a co-defendant's confession.

T. Eugene Thompson, 35, accused of being the mastermind in the slaying of his wife, Carol, 34, March 6, also asked that the co-defendant, Dick W. C. Anderson, be given a mental test.

Hennepin County District Court Judge William D. Gunn said he would hear arguments on the motions Thursday.

Thompson, a rising attorney in the Twin Cities, is charged with plotting the death of his wife after insuring her for more than \$1 million. Norman Mastrian, 39, an ex-prizefighter from Spring Lake Park, Minn., has been accused of being the "middle man."

All three — including Anderson, an ex-salesman who allegedly was the "trigger man" in the slaying at the Thompson home — have been charged with first degree murder.

McNeil Island Prisoner Missing

McNEIL ISLAND (UPI)—A search was under way today for Terry McGuire, 37, a bank robber reported missing from McNeil Island federal penitentiary.

McGuire, of Clearwater, Wash., was serving a 25-year sentence for robbing a bank at Forks of more than \$40,000. The holdup occurred in 1960 and McGuire began serving his sentence in 1961 after pleading guilty.

He was missed during a regular check at the prison at 5 p.m. Monday. Pierce county sheriff's officers and FBI agents were participating in the search which was centering on the island proper, located in Puget Sound near Tacoma. The surrounding mainland was also included in the search area.
