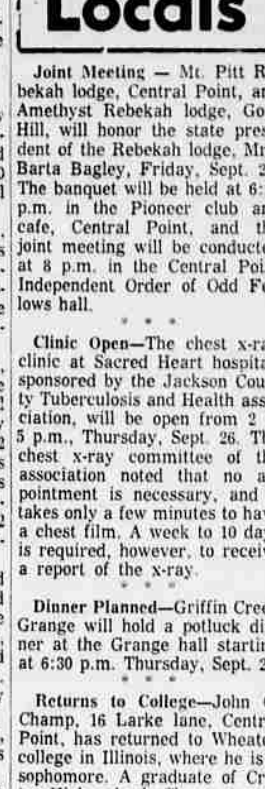

GOLD HILL—Ronald Brown, Medford Mail Tribune carrier for route 1 in Gold Hill, has been awarded a Youth Insurance Scholarship certificate of merit, showing that he has been selected as a national finalist in the annual Deane Weinberg and company Youth Insurance Scholarship competition.

The award is based on his outstanding record in route performance, scholastic attainment, and evidence of leadership ability. The certificate, presented to young Brown recently is signed by Paul L. Jones, chairman of the selection committee, and Deane Weinberg Jr.

He is the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Byron E. Brown, 1204 Second ave., Gold Hill, and has lived here the past 11 years.

The youth started his paper route July 1, 1960, because he wanted a job to earn money. He delivers about 90 newspapers a day on the route. Klamath Schedules 3 Murder Trials

KLAMATH FALLS — (UPI)—Three murder trials have been scheduled to begin in Circuit court here in October and November. Tom Wesley Dean of Klamath Falls will go on trial Oct. 31 on a charge of second degree murder for the fatal stabbing of his brother, Hagan Lindbergh.

Archie Foster of Salem will go on trial Nov. 11 on a charge of first degree murder for the fatal shooting of Mrs. Eunice Biss of Beatty.

The second degree murder trial of William Unsworth of Klamath Falls is scheduled to get under way Nov. 18 for the fatal shooting of Tony Moore of Klamath Falls.

Unsworth was found guilty of second degree murder and sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oregon Penitentiary last year but the conviction was reversed by the State Supreme Court.

School Problems Reviewed at Club Meeting in City

The plan to use the 35 acre tract northeast of Medford has not been discarded. Frank Bash, chairman of the Medford school board, said in a luncheon address here Tuesday.

The site, near the approach path of the Medford airport, has been the subject of some controversy recently, Bash said, and a full study as to the effect of jet-powered planes near schools in metropolitan areas is under way.

Speaking before the Medford Rotary club at the Rogue Valley Country club, Bash said that Medford has three possibilities in planning future high school facilities. The choice is between two high schools, a single large school or enlargement of the present plant.

"We just have too many students for the buildings we have," he told Rotarians. A total of 2,016 students are now enrolled, and projected increases will add to the problem substantially before new construction can be completed in approximately four years.

Caused By Uncertainty Delay in effecting broader school facilities was caused by the uncertainty of election involving the Phoenix district, Bash said. This delay can become beneficial since the studies of the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Education here and new techniques in buildings and curriculum will mean better schools when the program is finally determined and undertaken.

Dr. David Boals, school board member, described to Rotarians the temporary, pre-fabricated buildings on the Medford High school front lawn. These 30 by 40 foot buildings are heated and ventilated to full standards, adequately lighted and windowless, providing what the speaker termed a "controlled atmosphere for learning."

The temporary houses, Dr. Boals said, are near the school so that costly plumbing might be eliminated and can be moved at any time. The cost of each structure is approximately \$2,300.

Describes Committee William Williams, Medford Chamber of Commerce president and a member of the Citizens' Committee on Education described briefly the structure of the committee and emphasized the fact that its function is entirely advisory to the Medford school board.

"Since our judgment can be no better than our information," Williams pointed out, the committee is drawing upon the knowledge and experience of educators and experts in every phase of school planning and curriculum.

One of these speakers is Dr. Keith Goldhammer, director of the bureau of educational research of the school of education at the University of Oregon. The local committee will hear Dr. Goldhammer at 7:30 tonight at the Medford High school lecture center.

Fugitive Robber Makes FBI List

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Carl Close, a fugitive bank robber who once tried to engineer an airlift escape from a penitentiary by helicopter, has been placed on the FBI's list of 10 most wanted criminals.

Close is sought for armed bank robberies in Baltimore and Roanoke, Va., in March and June of this year. Described as "extremely dangerous," he is believed hiding out with a man, a woman and an infant who are relatives.

He has been quoted as vowing never to be taken alive. Close's bank robbing career dates back to 1949 when he and two relatives were caught after hold ups in Maryland and West Virginia.

For identification purposes, there is a small mole on his chin, a small scar on his right thigh, another on his right thigh. In addition he has scars from appendectomy and hernia operations.

Close stands 5 feet, 10 inches tall, weighs around 190 pounds and has a heavy muscular build. He has a medium complexion, black hair and brown eyes.
