They may be a true sardine, a herring or a pilchard. The herring family of fishes includes the most numbers of individuals of any fish species.

In the ecology of the sea, the multitudes of herring form one of the most important links in the food chain. These little, silvery fish form the food requirements of vast schools of larger fish. In man's economy too, they have a tremendous importance as the catching and processing of herring probably outranks all other of man's bounties from the sea. Herring is possibly the world's most important sea food.

Mississippi Negro Student Expelled

OXFORD, Miss. (UPI)—The University of Mississippi today returned to "all white" status.
The university's only Negro student, Cleve McDowell, 21, was expelled Tuesday for carrying a pistol. The action, taken on the recommendation of the student Judicial Council, returned to the Deep South state its unique system of totally segregated public schools.
McDowell had been admitted to "Ole Miss" without incident last June.
The university was desegregated under federal court order the previous year and paved the way for the entrance of the school's first Negro student, James H. Meredith on Aug. 31, 1962.

Building Permits In City Increase

Building permits issued in Medford in August, 1963, increased to \$731,800. The figure for the same month in 1962 was \$261,620, according to the University of Oregon bureau of business research.
The state total, however, showed a decrease. It included \$14,666,669 for 1,191 dwelling units; \$6,524,034 for non-residential construction; and \$4,240,878 for additions, alterations and repairs of existing structures.
The total for August, 1962, was \$66,453,900, including \$43,539,552 for non-residential construction.
