

Organization for Indians Planned

A local organization to keep alive the legends of the first inhabitants of this continent, the American Indians, will be formed Saturday night, Sept. 28, according to announcement from Mr. and Mrs. Carl McLean of Medford.

They have issued an invitation to all persons who are descendants of American Indians or who are interested in perpetuating the traditions of the race.

Anyone interested in Indian lore, Indian artifacts and Indian history will be welcomed to the meeting to be held in the Redmen Hall at 8 p.m.

The McLeans, who are both descendants of American Indians, organized the American

Indian Center in Portland, the only one in this state. There are also centers in San Francisco, Los Angeles and Chicago, Mrs. McLean said.

McLean, a descendant of the Sioux tribe in the Dakotas, is what is called a "city Indian." However, Mrs. McLean, a descendant of the Blackfoot tribe of Montana, lived on a reservation.

The McLeans have moved to Medford from Portland.

Green, Neuberger Open New Chapter In Oregon Politics

WASHINGTON—A fascinating new chapter in Oregon politics has been opened by the state's two Democratic ladies in Congress.

The first and most tangible by-product of their meetings was the quick, unanimous decision by which the Oregon congressional Democrats selected a candidate for U.S. marshal, Eugene R. Hullett of Eugene, within a few days after the death of Marshall Paul Kearney.

For over two years since President Kennedy's election, Republican Kearney remained in office primarily because the Oregon Democrats were unable to agree on a qualified successor. They were in disagreement not because this is a tough post to fill but because of friction within the delegation.

The virtual estrangement of Mrs. Neuberger and Mrs. Green was a major friction point in the awkwardness with which the Democrats have handled patronage since Kennedy took office. Mrs. Green asserted authority by virtue of her closeness to Kennedy after heading his Oregon campaign; and Sen. Neuberger asserted authority by virtue of every senator's power to block confirmation of patronage appointments in his state which require Senate confirmation.

Senator By-Passed

Thus, Mrs. Neuberger refused to clear the appointment of Sidney Lezack of Portland

for U.S. attorney. So the Justice Department, at Mrs. Green's urging, for all practical purposes by-passed the senator and named Lezack "acting U.S. attorney," the status he continues to hold.

Later, Mrs. Green declined to go along with Mrs. Neuberger's choice for marshal, Burdette F. Emery of Portland. Sen. Wayne Morse also declined—and the marshal post was left in GOP hands.

Morse's participation in these sticky patronage matters was no less awkward. Until his reelection last fall, it was apparent he tried to avoid taking sides against any of various Democra-

tic factions in order to secure their campaign support. This year, it has appeared to some, Morse has seemed no more interested in resolving the internal problems of his adopted party—and some suspect him of trying to perpetuate friction between the two ladies.

Discussion Over Dinner

In any event, Mrs. Green took the initiative and Mrs. Neuberger responded immediately to establishing friendly relations. They met for an amiable private discussion over dinner.

They discovered they had occasionally fallen victims to unfounded rumors about one another. Their new relationship,

based on close communication, is designed to eliminate this hazard in the future.

The choice of a new marshal was reached in a delegation meeting the morning after the two ladies had dined together for the second time in a week. They also joined in endorsing U.S. Judge Gus J. Solomon for appointment to the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, and a few days later jointly held a luncheon at the Capitol in Judge Solomon's honor.

The judgeship decision appears to be more significant than that of the marshal. For if there was one single incident which set off the patronage entanglement of the past few years it was a rumor Mrs. Neuberger heard that Mrs. Green would never agree to the appointment of Alan Hart, Portland attorney, as a federal judge in case a vacancy occurred on the Oregon bench.

Mrs. Neuberger was indignant because the rumor had it that the reason for the congresswoman's attitude was that Hart had served as the senator's campaign manager. Mrs. Neuberger's reaction was to retaliate and block the Lezack appointment until she received assurances that Hart would not be discriminated against for a judgeship.

This is understood to be one of the things Mrs. Green and Mrs. Neuberger discussed privately in recent days. Mrs. Green is understood to have no personal objections to Hart on any grounds, although her own first choice might be another Portland attorney, Jack Beatty.

Mrs. Neuberger is inclined to think Oregon's contender for the circuit judgeship at San Francisco will be passed over because the administration may first try to find a qualified judge endorsed by a Democratic senator who is seeking reelection next year as a means of helping that senator to demonstrate his influence in high places.

Sens. Mike Mansfield of Montana and Henry M. Jackson of Washington, both influential with the administration, are up for election next year, as is the ailing Sen. Clair Engle of California. Before a selection is made, probably most of the nine states in the 9th circuit will offer candidates for the post.

If Judge Solomon is tapped, a choice of his successor on the federal district bench at Portland will test the new accord within the Oregon delegation. If he is not, it may be for the reasons Sen. Neuberger envisions.

Escapes Sought In Pendleton Area

PENDLETON (UPI) — An intensive search was under way near here today for two escapees from the Washington State penitentiary.

The search for Orland Morgan and Milton Ventura turned to this area after a produce truck stolen from Walla Walla about 8 p.m. Wednesday was found abandoned three miles east of here. The two men escaped Tuesday night.

Authorities found footprints of two men leading from the truck and heading north across a field.

Morgan figured in the news here four years ago when he and two other men escaped from the Walla Walla prison, made their way to a home near Weston and bound and gagged a couple in their home, taking food, clothing, guns and a car. They were caught several weeks later in Idaho.

Portland Authority Defends Policy

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Housing Authority of Portland today fought back at criticism that it has practiced racial discrimination and gave chairman Roy Renoud a strong vote of confidence.

In a statement, the Housing Authority's board of commissioners called the charges "hysterical and irresponsible."

"The Housing Authority of Portland in the past has followed a strict policy of providing equal opportunity for all applicants for public housing. . . It pledges that this policy will be continued," the statement added.

California Couple Hurt in Accident

A California couple was reported in critical condition at Rogue Valley hospital following a two-vehicle accident shortly before noon Wednesday on Highway 99 south of the Medford city limits.

In critical condition are Robert Edlow Whitlock, 51, Coleville, Calif., and his wife, Lucille Marietta Whitlock, 46. Whitlock is a sheriff's deputy in Momo county.

In fair condition at the same hospital is Mrs. Doris Ruth Evanson, 39, of 1251 Kings highway, Medford, driver of the southbound car, according to Oregon state police.

Police said the Evanson vehicle was making a left turn into the Dean and Taylor Pontiac company when it was struck by the northbound Whitlock car.
