Knife, Fork Club Dinner Meeting Set

Reservations for the first lecture in the Rogue Valley Knife and Fork club series on Tuesday, October 1, should be made by Saturday, September 28 with Mrs. Richard House, 15 Corning court, club officers have announced.

The lecture will be given by Dr. Hubert Herring, whose topic will concern Latin America. The dinner session will be held in Rogue Valley Country club. Central and South America have provided him with a challenge which he meets successfully in books, teaching and lecturing, advance reports indicate. He has the ability to make his analysis come vividly alive to reader and listener while at the same time maintaining meticulous accuracy of fact, it is further related.

A pioneer in North America's belated discovery of Latin American people, Dr. Herring has been making annual trips to the 20 republics to the south for the past 30 years. He has maintained contacts with political and cultural leaders in all these countries. In 1960 the speaker retired as professor of Latin American civilization at Pomona college and Claremont Graduate school where he began teaching in 1944. He is the author of several books, among them, "A History of Latin America," "Good Neighbors," "Mexico, the Making of a Nation," and "America and the Americas." Dr. Herring also was in Cuba in the summer of 1959 making a study of the forces behind the late revolution in which Fidel Castro unseated Dictator Batista. He has a dramatic and authoritative account of "Fidel Castro's Revolution in Cuba, What It Means to the Americans and Cubans."

While in Eagle Point High school, Miss Betts was a majorette and baton twirler and participated in school talent shows and numerous other activities, including bowling, in which she was a trophy winner. She was Drama club secretary in 1960 and staged shows for the Parent Teacher association and Veterans of Foreign Wars, and also was a finalist in a speech tournament in Eugene and Forest Grove.

The dancer also participated in the Varsity Squads variety show, performed in a high school play and directed and played a leading role in another at the school.

After completing high school she moved with her family to Los Angeles and there was the supervisor's secretary in the Security department of Douglas Aircraft corporation. She also was a member and trophy winner with a bowling team from the company, and presented her rendition of "I Enjoy Being a Girl," at the Miramar club in Santa Monica, Calif.

She moved earlier this year from Los Angeles to Las Vegas with her family and accepted the secretarial position with the AEC.
