

This Week's Plan for Home Builders

Here is a refreshingly uncomplicated ranch-modern plan that imposes clean, contemporary lines on a basically traditional exterior. Adept design and basic shape account for the practicality, a easy care and handsome look of this home.

The crisp, uncluttered roof line has been achieved due to the rectangular shape of the house. This shape plan is also the most economical to construct. Note how beams project out from the roof gables and how the roof extends out from the house at an angle. This feature increases the attractiveness of the exterior and causes the house to appear wider.

The furnace and laundry facilities are in an offset at the rear of the garage. The water heater also is in the garage. This eliminates the necessity of providing expensive space in the house for these items and there is no chance of water damage if the water heater or washer should leak.

Plan Is Compact
The floor plan is compact without one feeling cramped or confined. There are four bedrooms, two baths, a living and family room plus a kitchen in less than 1,600 square feet.

The central entry hall is the crossroad for the house as traffic to all areas converges here. Very seldom does one find a plan with this number of rooms and square footage with such an excellent traffic pattern.

Portlander Elected by First National Bank

Although there are three possible entries to the kitchen, the cabinets have been located in such a manner they do not form any awkward corners. Such corners are much harder to use and therefore less efficient. Broom and pantry closets are next to the built-in oven so there will be no broken cabinet lines as these three are all two feet in depth. Note the exceptionally wide eating space in the kitchen.

From the entry, one can look through the living room and out through the sliding glass doors to the patio and rear garden. This area is also accessible through sliding glass doors in the family room. These large glass areas visually enlarge

both of these rooms. A built-in desk plus a storage closet open to the hall off the family room. The bedrooms are separated by either wardrobes or baths. The two front bedrooms have direct access to a three-quarter bath.

School Association Urges 'Yes' Vote

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Association of County School Superintendents has gone on record to urge a "yes" vote on the income tax measure at the Oct. 15 special election, it was announced today.

The unanimous vote in support of the tax measure was cast at the organization's meeting here.

The superintendents said "Failure to pass the tax increase will force the legislature into special session and bring about reduced state contributions to education which will increase the local property taxes if schools are to be maintained at their existing levels of excellence."

"The county superintendents recognize that most of the increased budget of the state government is due to increased basic school support and increased expenditures for higher education and community colleges," said Lynn Hampton, Sherman county school superintendent and president of the organization.

Better Pay Needed To Get Good Men

GEARHART, Ore. (UPI)—A Denver businessman told the Better Business Relations conference here Tuesday the answer to the problem of attracting better men to politics is more pay.

John M. King, 36, president of King-Stevens Gas and Oil Co., said that men who deal in big budget figures should themselves be more amply rewarded. He recommended that state legislators be paid a minimum of \$20,000 a year, congressmen \$100,000 a year, tax-free, and senators \$250,000 a year, tax-free.

King went on to say a successful businessman is not necessarily a successful man in politics.

"No collective group is more ignorant about getting into politics than successful businessmen," he said.

The national fund raising vice chairman for the Republican party told his audience the first thing a businessman must realize is that he can't start at the top in politics, that the volunteer worker "must do 'grunt' work at precinct level before he can advance."

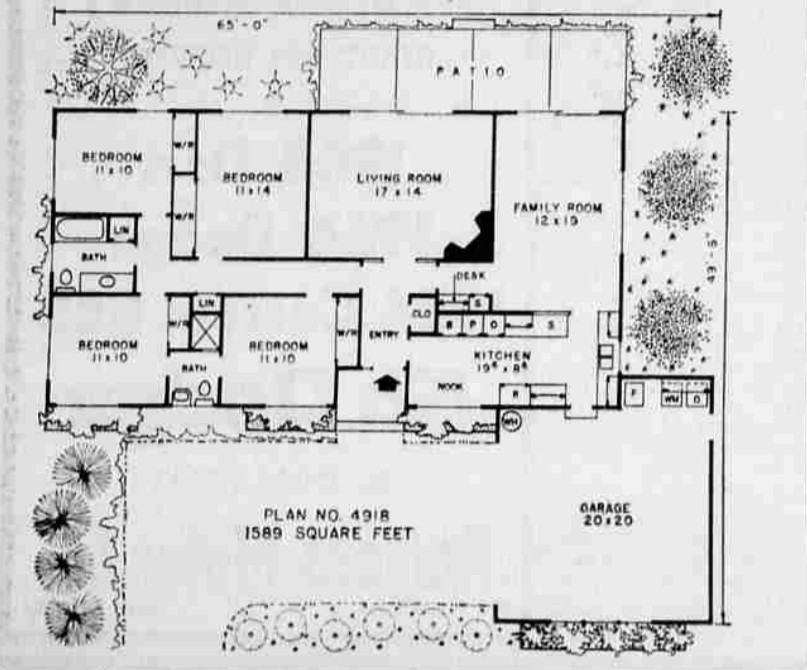
