

Joe Perry Put Back on Squad
SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A pair of great names from the days when the San Francisco Forty Niners won football games were back on the roster today.

End-flanker Clyde Conner and fullback Joe Perry, pro football's all-time top ground gainer, were placed back on the squad yesterday and will be ready to go Sunday at Minneapolis against the Minnesota Vikings.

Perry, who twice gained over 1,000 yards for the prospectors, was picked up two weeks ago after being cut loose by the Baltimore Colts. He was signed to the taxi squad and has not as yet played in a regular game this season.

Conner ranked as San Francisco's third best pass receiver a year ago although he was hampered by injuries throughout the season. This time he is coming off the injured reserve list. His return is expected to free flanker back Jim Johnson for duty in the defensive backfield.

St. Mary's Meets IV Saturday Night

Rogue league football provides the competition this week end at the Medford stadium. St. Mary's entertains the Illinois Valley Cougars in the first conference rivalry of the fall for both schools. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

The Crusaders of Medford reportedly will enter combat with lineup readjusted to compensate for injury to a number of players. IV also has its wounded but is reported pretty well over a preseason rash of ailments.

Coach Bill McKibbin of St. Mary's still was uncertain on whether freshman Eric Jensen or junior Anthony Mete will be at quarterback to start. Jensen started at the post last week although regular John Batzer, who'd had a hand injury, did get into action. When Batzer hurt his knee this week, McKibbin called on Mete to learn the general duties.

Scene Shifted
Center Dan Kosmatka, with a turned ankle, and guard John Lucas, with a back injury, McKibbin shifted the scene of practice to St. Mary's area of practice and sawdust to the lawn rocks at Hawthorne park and Crusaders drilled without cleats. But that did not stop the hurts.

The coach has named Wayne Cook to start at center. It's felt that Lucas will be able to be at guard along with Steve Cook. Mike Hutchinson is still hobbled by a knee injury in the Glendale game and John Renshaw likely will open at his tackle with Randy Richter at the other. End Ray Richter has a knee hurt, too, but may be ready for defensive work on Saturday.

McKibbin said earlier this week, "Quite a few will have to be iron men and go both ways." Corliss may be at linebacker filling the defensive gap left by Batzer. Some other interior linemen will be shifted to Corliss's spot. The coach indicated that Steve Cook, who's had some duty at defensive halfback may be used on front wall defense. Ron Becker has had the flu but it is thought he'll be on hand for action.

Work on Passing
"We're trying to get our passing attack down better," Coach Bill Stewart reported from Illinois Valley. "We've had a couple of pretty good practice sessions." Cougar skipper said, "I hope we're ready to go."

In IV's Darryl Gellert fans will see one of the top passers of the state last year. The passes haven't clicked quite so well this season but Stewart "doing better."

"We want to play and hold our own with small college football teams in the northwest," Craven has said. The Quaker mentor reportedly has 18 boys on his squad from out of state and Schopf says he's heard that some of them are from the East.

Schopf told the Medford Kiwanis club that Southern Oregon is "looking for a good game" with George Fox.

Tornado Battles Salem's Vikings

Class A-1 champion of 1962 against the runnerup. That rematch in an inter-district game provides one of the top prestige attractions this evening on the Oregon high school football scene.

The adversaries are the Medford Black Tornado, the title winner, and the North Salem Vikings, who were beaten in the final game.

They collide in Salem with 8 o'clock the kickoff time. This scuffle will be on Bennett field, adjacent to South Salem high.

The fracas, although without league or district meaning, is significant in several ways. North, along with seeking a measure of requital for the championship game defeat, will aim to hang onto its rating as No. 1 team in the state. Only one week ago Medford had that top ranking. A triumph over the Viks might not get it back but the Tornado could blow the Salems off the perch and regain some lost prestige.

Can They Come Back?
Foremost in the minds of Medford fans, however, is the question: "Can the Hurricane whirl up a comeback after suffering a crushing defeat?" The Tornado was thumped by Boise last week end by 25 to 0.

Also, the encounter is one of several which will help give a picture on how Southern Oregon conference teams can expect to fare against each other. Last week the Valley leaguers of North Salem knotted Grants Pass of the Southern circuit. Next week the Vikings meet Klamath Falls, another SO conference member.

Medford offensive and defensive lines have been somewhat lightened by a switch to full platooning. How the revamped

North also has established early defensive reputation, making it dangerous particularly for the passing of their adversaries.

Medford whipped Corvallis 21 to 0 before its Boise jaunt. North downed South Salem 26 to 6 before its 19 to 19 tie at Grants Pass.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners lost one reserve quarterback, but may have gained another Wednesday.

Ralph Guglielmi, obtained from the New York Giants for defensive halfback Eddie Dove and a draft choice, refused to report to the Forty Niners.

The ex-Notre Dame All American performer said he would prefer to devote his time to his insurance business in Washington, D.C. The Forty Niners sent Dove to New York anyway in return for a higher draft choice than the original agreement called for.

Then the Prospectors announced that they had claimed rights to Lamar McHan, a 205-pound veteran who was placed on the waiver list by the Baltimore Colts.

However, McHan said he would withhold his decision on whether to join the San Francisco club until next week. The Forty Niners placed him on their reserve list.

In the meantime, Bobby Walters, who had been working out with the defensive backfield, returned to quarterbacking in drills Wednesday. The Forty Niners want to have somebody handy should starter John Brodie be forced out of action.

The Cleveland Browns, early surprises of the National Football league season, are whipping favorites to win their third straight game Sunday, but it looks like tough going for the two other perfect - record clubs - the Chicago Bears and St. Louis Cardinals.

The Browns are a 13-point pick to send the Los Angeles Rams down to their third straight defeat at Cleveland; the Bears are only a 2 - point pick over the Lions at Detroit, while the Cardinals are 6 1/2 point underdogs against the Steelers at Pittsburgh.

In Sunday's other games, the champion Packers are the choice by 13 points over the Baltimore Colts at Green Bay; the New York Giants are favored by 4 1/2 over the Eagles at Philadelphia; the Minnesota Vikings are picked by 7 at home over the San Francisco Forty Niners, and the Washington Redskins are the choice by 3 in their home - opener against the Dallas Cowboys.
