Relief Promised From Heat Wave

By United Press International The weather man promised some relief today from an early fall heat wave that brought a record temperature of 104 to Medford Thursday. Some cooling was forecast Saturday and Sunday but higher than normal temperatures, generally in the 80s were expected along the immediate coast. Medford's 104 was the highest there so late in the season, according to the weather man. Brisk east winds were forecast through Cascade passes, raising the forest fire danger with the deer hunting season opening Saturday. Humidities were low. Some other high temperatures Thursday included Redmond 95, Burns 91, Klamath Falls, Baker and The Dalles 90, Pendleton 87, Salem 82, Astoria 81, Portland 79 and Newport 76.

McCloud Lumber Company Sold

NEW YORK (UPI) — United States Plywood Corp. has purchased for almost \$41 million in cash the McCloud River Lumber Co. in northern California, S.W. Antoville, board chairman of U.S. Plywood, said today. The purchase includes one of the last large stands of virgin pine left in the United States, he said.

The property includes 1.2 billion board feet of standing timber on 86,000 acres of forest land, contract rights on an additional 1.1 billion feet of timber, an integrated lumber plant and a complete town.

Properties of the McCloud firm are located about 300 miles north of San Francisco, near U.S. Plywood timber holdings that supply its complex in Shasta county.

"This acquisition raises our timber holdings to 10.7 billion board feet owned or controlled in the United States and Canada," Gene C. Brewer, U.S. Plywood president said.

Brewer said the McCloud operation would continue to operate at full capacity. The town of McCloud has a population of more than 2,500.

Seven Indicted in Land Sale Fraud

PORTLAND (UPI) — Seven Chicago and Los Angeles area men Thursday were indicted a second time for conspiracy and fraud in the sale of land in the Lake Valley subdivisions near Burns.

Officials in the U.S. attorney's office here said the latest indictment contains the same charges as the first, but it applies rulings made recently by U.S. District Judge John K. Kilkenney, who found some of the language in the first indictment legally objectionable.

They said the first indictment probably would be dismissed. Defendants are Abraham L. Koollish, David Frank Koollish, John Milton Phillips Jr., and Jack C. Cherber, all of Chicago and Evanston, Ill., and Maurice Arthur Hall, George E. Isaacs and Richard Dale Walker, all of Los Angeles.

Trial is set to start Nov. 25 at Pendleton.

Sharks Fight Over Body of Woman; Two Men Rescued

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) — Coast Guardsmen in a helicopter plucked two men from a makeshift raft in the Gulf of Mexico Thursday and then watched in horror as a pack of sharks fought over the body of the wife of one of the rescued men.

Kenneth Crosby, 32, and James Dumas, 27, were recuperating in a hospital here today. Dumas' wife, Ann, 27, had died on the raft before the helicopter arrived.

Two Days and Nights The rescue marked the end of two days and nights in the wind-whipped Gulf after a 38-foot fishing boat went down with the Dumas and Crosby aboard. The two men were picked up about 80 miles west of here.

"When we first spotted the raft, he (Dumas) was holding onto Crosby and the body of his wife," said Cmdr. Martin Flesch, pilot of the helicopter.

"But he told us later that he just couldn't hold on any longer."

Flesch said the helicopter circled the area to come in for a landing and Mrs. Dumas' body was about 100 yards away from the raft in a mass of sharks.

"About all you could see were fins," he said, and "a flurry of foam and blood."

The Coast Guard said Mrs. Dumas was seven months pregnant. She died Wednesday night on the raft.

One Man Delirious When the two men were brought here, Crosby was delirious from drinking salt water the day before, and Dumas was weak from exposure to sun and high waves.

Flesch said Dumas told him that the fishing boat Ev-Ann went down Tuesday night between 9 and 9:30 p.m., after hitting something or being hit by something in the dark.

The makeshift raft on which the three were floating appeared to be the inverted siding of a deckhouse, Flesch said.

Three Men Hurt In Tank Explosion

LYNN, Mass. (UPI) — Three persons were injured early today when a huge liquid oxygen tank exploded outside a building at the highly classified General Electric Co. river works plant and was hurled 200 feet over a 2 1/2 story building.

A 400-pound piece of jagged metal was torn off the tank. The 20-foot long 10 foot wide and 1-foot thick chunk was "scaled like a flattened beer can" over a nearby building and landed in front of the plant's infirmary, officials said.

Almost all windows in buildings 100 yards from the scene were shattered. There was no fire.

The explosion occurred outside a brick building where highly volatile gases are mixed for experiments on jet engines and other highly classified equipment, including projects for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, they said.

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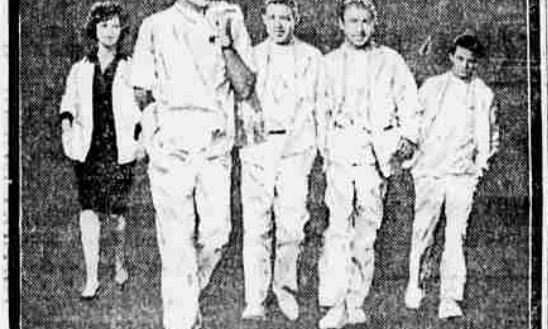
