

Writ of Mandamus Dismissed by Court

Friday afternoon Circuit Judge James M. Main dismissed an alternate writ of mandamus brought by Mrs. Ann Todd against the Eagle Point Irrigation district.

Mrs. Todd was seeking free access to the district records. Judge Main reminded Mrs. Todd she was under court order as part of her probation. She is not to be in the irrigation district office except for specified purposes, according to this order, he said. Such specified purposes do not include inspection of all documents.

The conclusions drawn from evidence presented showed it would be unreasonable to ask the district to allow her to inspect all records, Judge Main said.

JFK Trip Labeled 'Campaign Tour'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Republican National Chairman William E. Miller labeled the President Kennedy's current Western trip as "an out-and-out campaign tour at public expense."

The White House has carefully described the speaking tour as "non-political." The trip was scheduled as a means of letting the President visit conservation projects and to speak on the government's natural resources program, officials said.

Miller charged Friday night that Kennedy's Salt Lake City speech advocated foreign policy proposals associated generally by Sen. Barry M. Goldwater without mentioning the Arizona Republican by name.

"The last vestige of pretense has been removed from the tongue-in-cheek description of the President's Western tour as a non-political one," Miller said.

"In behalf of the taxpayers of this country I must vehemently protest the diversion of public funds toward financing of an out-and-out campaign tour; and I would call to the attention of fair-minded Americans of both parties that the President is grossly abusing his prerogative," Miller said.

Because Of Dam There Are No Bars In Whiskeytown

WHISKEYTOWN, Calif. (UPI)—President Kennedy is not to blame but because of that dam he's dedicated here Saturday there are no bars in Whiskeytown.

When a Whiskeytowner wants a convivial drink, he must leave this little community with the ferocious name and make an embarrassed appearance at some routine place like Redding, Calif., 10 miles east.

"It's quite a blow not to have a bar," said John William Roche, Whiskeytown's acting postmaster, keeper of its general store and former proprietor of its defunct saloon.

Roche closed the saloon because not even a man of his various talents could keep going under 200 feet of water, which is where all of the old town went when the reservoir behind Whiskeytown Dam filled to its brim last month with 69.4 billion gallons of tame and lilypond water.

Thirty Left

Before the flood, Whiskeytown had a population of about 200 retired goldminers, loggers, cattlemen and other ramblous folk. Now, at the new location, about one mile away on higher ground, there are 30. However, many of the former Whiskeytowners are still in the area, at next door communities like French Gulch.

Initially, Roche failed to rebuild the saloon alongside his new general store because of a tangle involving state licensing requirements. However, he now believes that the tangle can be unraveled.

But lately, as he views 11 miles of sparkling new lake, and sees its natural beauty and recreation potential, he has come to believe that a new drinking spot "couldn't be just a saloon."

"It should be," he said, "a place for all Americans, not just the drinking people."

Roche has not decided when he might build his all-American, Whiskeytown bar — for social drinkers only. But it will come sooner or later, he said.

When it's built, tourists will

find the place about 230 miles northeast of San Francisco on the eastern slope of California's coastal mountains. It won't be far from the old ghost towns of Igo, Ono, Qtiety Hill, Muletown, Horsetown and One Horse-town. Nearby also are the still active communities of Hayfork and Peanut.

Two Names

Gold miners founded the town in 1849 on the banks of Whiskey Creek, so-called, apparently, because someone once dropped a keg of the stuff in the water. When the post office opened in 1855, the town was known as both Whiskey Creek and Whiskeytown.

The post office closed nine years later, and when it reopened in 1881, postal authorities refused to accept the old name. They believed it lacked dignity. During the next 71 years Whiskeytowners fought against such names as Franklin, Blair, Stel and Schilling. They won their battle in 1952 when Washington officially gave the place its present name.

Three years later, Congress authorized the dam that washed the old place away.

247 Suffer Eye Damage During Eclipse

NEW YORK (UPI)—The warning was circulated widely before-hand—that looking directly at the eclipse of the sun last July 20 could cause permanent eye damage.

But many who read or heard of the warnings looked anyway. Today, the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, Inc., released statistics on a post-eclipse survey it made of ophthalmologists to determine the number of cases of eye damage.

Four had poor vision in one eye prior to watching the eclipse. Vision in the good eye was damaged.

More Will Show

In announcing results of the study, Dr. John W. Ferree, executive director of the society, said that undoubtedly more cases of damage will show later.

Ten were in isolated areas or for some reason did not receive warnings. One case history was of a patient who could not read. Two who suffered damage had astronomy as a hobby. Two misunderstood the directions for watching the eclipse by reflecting it through a pinhole in a piece of white cardboard. They had looked directly at the sun through the pinhole.

Four had poor vision in one eye prior to watching the eclipse. Vision in the good eye was damaged.
