# Recharged Black Tornados Prep Football Subdue North Salem 32-13

SALEM—What happens out of state just doesn't count so far as Oregon prep football is concerned. And, if you are a firm advocate and believer of the weekly rating polls, put that Medford High School Black Tornado back on top.

For the Big Whirlwind from southern Oregon, one week returned from a disastrous jaunt into Idaho, clearly vindicated itself and stood forth once more as a powerhouse after Friday night. Medford's Black Horde smashed 32 to 13 the rugged, scrapping North Salem Vikings who had succeeded them as

comes of other pre-league games have now established the Black Tornado as the favorite in the Southern Oregon conference. Medford, revamped and recharged after bowing 25 to 0 to Boise, Idaho, led in the statistics here Friday in the scrap on Bennett field. The Tornados outgained the Vikes both in the air and on the ground for net scrimmage difference of 271 yards to 184.

First Big Wind touchdown came after a couple of North Salem threats. North drove off the opening kickoff to the Tornado 25 where, on fourth down, Medford's line forced stubbornly and stopped the Vikings short of first down.

# Crater Gridders Swamp Red Devils Of Coquille 48-13

CENTRAL POINT—The Class A-2 Coquille Red Devils were no match here Friday night for the A-1 Crater High school Comets. Central Point's Fireball footballers trounced the Devils by a score of 48 to 13.

Crater scored in all four periods of the fracas, including three times in the second quarter and two times in the third. Sperm Kiger crossed the goal line three times for Crater, Vern Swanson twice and John Hall and Gary Schwab each once in a tangle highlighted by long gains.

Swanson had dashes of 78 and 45 yards, Schwab one of 70 and Kiger one of 45. Mike Inger raced 72 yards for the first TD of the Devils.

Third Victory  
Quarter scores were 7 to 0, 28 to 6 and 41 to 6 as Crater ran its season unbeaten string to three. It was the third loss in as many times on the field for Coquille.

The Comets reached touchdown land in the first few minutes of the game. Gains by Swanson and Darryl Summerfield led up to the score. Sperm Kiger went the final six yards. Gerald Branch made the first of five conversion kicks. The drive from the Comet 45 took just nine plays.

A 30-yard punt return by Chuck Taylor teed the second counter. Swanson then took a pitchout from Roger Neufeld and swept right end on his 45-yard TD play. Coquille fumbled on the ensuing kickoff. Larry Glawe recovered for the Fireballs on the Devil 40-yard line. Crater powered to the 15. From there Hall went over for six points.

Just before the halftime gun, Kiger intercepted a Devil pass. He ran to the Coquille two-yard line and plunged over on the next play.

Swanson's sweep for 78 yards was next for the Comets. Then Kiger got away for his 45. Schwab got away on a cross buck for his long run. This time Kiger ran the extra point.

A pass play, Craig Johnson to Ivan Pearson was the second touchdown-maker for the Red Devils. Ted Church hurled to Wayne Johnson for the extra point.

Linemen Jack Peek and Larry Glawe showed well for the Comets along with backs Summerfield and Sig Milkowski. Coquille's Mike Inger played with the will to win but the Devils lacked the line strength to help him. He suffered a nose injury in the fourth quarter. Church and Rod Reiner showed good running ability for the Devils.

Crater outgained the Red Devils 492 to 279 in net scrimmage yards.

## Ashland Celebrates Gridiron Triumph

ASHLAND — Ashland high's Grizzlies had cause for celebration Friday night. After a winless 1962 and losses in two games this fall, the Bruins came through here with their first gridiron victory of 1963.

With line play improved tremendously and with Mike Torresan and Roger Atherton the rushing threats, Ashland whipped Sweet Home 20 to 7 in non-league competition.

The Grizzlies had all their touchdowns before the Huskies tabulated with 1 1/4 minutes left to play. Sweet Home gained pay soil against the Ashland sophomores who were in action the last three minutes of the game.

First half of the encounter was scoreless. Ashland tallied once in the third quarter and twice in the fourth with all three touchdowns by Torresan.

March 85 Yards  
He went the last six yards of an 85-yard march which took 15 plays, all on the ground. He intercepted a pass and ran 35 yards to the goal. He went the

last 16 yards around end on a five-play shove which began on the Sweet Home 40-yard line following a punt.

Dave Barger kicked two extra points.  
The Sweet Home counter was on a pass for 36 yards, Ed Seibert to Roger Biggs.

Sweet Home marched in 16 plays to the Ashland 36 off the opening kickoff. The Grizzlies held there and from then on it was their game, despite the Huskies showing fire. Stout defense helped the Ashlanders. The Huskies netted just 19 yards from scrimmage in the second quarter and only one in the third.

"Our kids felt this was one they really had to win and they went out to do it," Coach John Gray remarked.

## Ducks Scalp Indians, 36-7; Ragsdale Scores Tribe's TD

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI) — Oregon's hustling defense recovered six Stanford fumbles and intercepted two passes Saturday to set up four touchdowns and wallop the Indians, 36-7.

With quarterback Bob Berry, who passed for two touchdowns and scored another, bettending Stanford with his pass-run option plays, the Webfoots chalked up 21 points in the first 19 minutes of play to put the game out of reach.

The Indians, with three quarterbacks in the backfield who are supposed to be expert ball-handlers, time and again dropped the ball on handoffs — even before they were hit, and Oregon recovered the bobbles six out of seven times.

The repeated fumbles kept Stanford on the defensive most of the day and stymied what was supposed to be a potent offense.

The Webfoots got two touchdowns in the first quarter, both set up by fumbles. One score came on a 14-yard pass from Berry to Paul Burlinson; the other by Mel Renfro on an eight yard pass from Berry.

Stanford made its one sustained drive of the day early in the second quarter, going 71 yards in 12 plays with Dick Ragsdale taking a three-yard pass from Clark Weaver for the score. It was Ragsdale's fifth touchdown of the season.

Midway in the second quarter Oregon worked 78 yards in 19 plays with Berry going over on a sneaker from the one.

The Webfoots picked up nine points in the third stanza on a field goal by Don Corey from the 15 (set up by a fumble, naturally); and a touchdown on a pass from Doug Post to Ray Palm for eight yards (set up by an interception).

The last touchdown, also preceded by a Stanford fumble, came with Post going over from the one.

Berry, in addition to scoring one touchdown, completed 12 out of 23 passes for 216 yards. Seven of his passes were caught by end Dick Inwalle for 99 yards.

The Indian line held the mighty Renfro to a net of 34 yards gained in 12 carries.

## Cougars Tie Hawkeys

IOWA CITY, Iowa, (UPI) — Clutch passing Dave Mathieson and fleet Clarence Williams lifted injury-ridden Washington State from a two-touchdown deficit to a 14-14 tie with the favored Iowa Hawkeys Saturday.

The Cougars, down 14-0 at the half, scored on a 3-yard pass from Mathieson to end Cleve Blates in the third period and then tied the game on a 23-yard run by Williams with only 6:15 left in the game. The sure-footed Blates kicked both conversions.

Iowa, a two-touchdown favorite, barged 78 yards for a touchdown on its first series of downs, scoring on a 3-yard pass from quarterback Fred Riddle to halfback Paul Krause.

The Hawks added another TD in the second period on a 1-yard sneak by Riddle.

## Runs Go Far

Medford gained the end zone first on a Larry Vowell to Steve Toews pass for 17 yards after a Jim Cox punt rumbled for 57 yards had put the ball on the Viking 20-yard line. Then, next time Medford got the ball Greg Gandece raced 68 yards to the goal. Next Terry Winetroul blocked a punt by North's Gib Gilmore and Bill Houston fell on the ball in the end zone. That made it 20 to 0 at halftime.

Third quarter Medford fumbles were turned into touchdowns by the Vikes in this replay of last years state finalists. Lenny Martin tabulated from two yards out and Del Schaeffer went 10 yards on the opening play of Chapter No. 4. Score was 20 to 13.

Medford rallied back and struck like lightning when a Mike Barnes to Cox aerial became a 59-yard touchdown play. To close out the TD-making Cox ran over from two yards out with 1 1/2 minutes yet to go.

The Salems moved into Medford territory. But Jeff Lunkow, trying to pass, was hauled down for a 23-yard loss by Tom Wootton and the home club had to punt. That gave Medford the ball on its 32 yard line. Suddenly the Medforders gave Gandece a hole off right tackle. He boomed through and like a super-charged jeep raced to the NS goal.

Two plays after the kickoff Greg Dippel intercepted a Viking pass and Medford got possession on the North Salem 10. Gandece hit to the two-yard line but Murray fumbled and Salems' Malcolm Snider recovered on the 15 stripe.

Three tries netted but two yards and Gilmore went back to punt. Winetroul blocked the kick and the ball rolled into the end zone where Houston recovered it.
