Illinois Valley's Cougars Defeat SM

Illinois Valley High school's Cougars, demonstrating early that they would be masters in the game, clawed the St. Mary's Crusaders 25 to 0 here on Saturday night in the Rogue league football opener for the two schools.

Darryl Gellert crossed for all four touchdowns. But, it was not a one-man show. John Baumgardner and Ron Thornhill were the workhorse back packers while a sharp line ripped the way. Quarterback Gellert administered the coup de grace.

IV marched 60 yards to the goal the first time it got the ball. In the second period the Cougars fought 80 yards to TD land. Breaks in the third period twice were turned into scores.

The touchdowns were on gains of six and two yards and on two runs of one yard each. Baumgardner kicked an extra point.

Net 249 Yards. A wide margin in statistics was built up by the visitors from Cave Junction. The Cougars netted 249 yards from scrimmage while their stiff defense limited the Crusaders of Medford to 51. St. Mary's had a minus three yards rushing in the second half. IV had 14 first downs to five for the Crusaders.

While the IV running game collected 186 yards, Cougar Coach Bill Stewart indicated that he was not yet satisfied with the passing which got 63 on six completes. When the air attack catches fire, the mentor figures, the Cougars will be in good shape for the remainder of the season.

Noting that the Cave Junction club itself, was not up to full efficiency because of ailing gridders, Stewart declared that IV defensive play was much improved. Defensive ends Putsch and Duane Bridges, he said, played "real fine ball."

Stewart spoke of the bruising his club took while winning and remarked, "That St. Mary's bunch hit hard." The Cougars lost end Terry McNaught in the second quarter because of a hip pointer.

"They got a good look at our defense," said St. Mary's Coach Bill McKibbin, noting that IV had the ball for the majority of plays.

Baumgardner had 101 yards on 20 rushing plays and Thornhill 72 on 19.

Whirlwind Finish by Stan Musial In Opening World Series Tilt

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Stan (The Man) Musial bowed out of baseball today a slugger, the way he came into the major leagues with the St. Louis Cardinals 21 years ago.

Musial played his final game in a whirlwind finish — two hits in three times at bat.

The near 43-year-old Musial, now a grandfather, was honored in a one-hour long pre-game ceremonies when he told more than 27,000 fans "I'll always be here."

A Marine color guard and a Dixieland band marched ahead of Musial, riding in a spanking new automobile around Busch Stadium. Musial waved to fans who rose from seats to cheer him.

Removed From Lineup Musial beat out the first Cardinal hit in the fourth inning against Cincinnati and he added another hit in the sixth before manager Johnny Keane took him out of the lineup for the last time.

As to his future in baseball, the Cardinals made him a vice president, but Musial said in the dressing room "I don't really know what the public does in the summertime."

"I want to see the Kentucky Derby, the Indianapolis 500-mile Race, and go on a picnic on the Fourth of July with my family."

Before the game, which went 3-2 in 14 innings for St. Louis, Cardinal owner August A. Busch Jr. said Musial's No. 6 "will never again appear on a Cardinal uniform."

"Nobody could do justice to it again," Busch said. "The only other place No. 6 will appear will be in the baseball Hall of Fame. This is sort of a sad day for fans everywhere."

By one of those freak coincidences, southpaw Johnny Podres, who figures to be the Dodgers' second game starter against Downing, also was cuffed around in his last start on Saturday night. The Phillies murdered practically every pitch he served up to them, raking him for 12 hits and eight runs before he was kayoed in the second.

Battle of Leftys

That means the first two games of the current World Series will be strictly a battle of southpaws, with Ford, a 24-game winner, facing 25-game winner Koufax in the opener and Downing and Podres hooking up in the second contest.

Should Koufax need any help, the odds are Alton will call on still another left-hander from the bullpen in Ron Perranoski, who is easily the finest reliever in the game. Perranoski compiled a brilliant 1.67 earned run average this season while winning 16 games and losing only three.

If Ford should falter in the opener, Houk would come in with either Ralph Terry, a right-hander, or Steve Hamilton, a left-hander, depending on the situation at the time.

Following an off-day for travel on Friday, the site of the series will shift to Los Angeles for the third game on Saturday, Oct. 5.

Tommy Davis of the Dodgers won the National league batting championship for the second straight season with a .326 average and Carl Yastrzemski of Boston led the American league with a .321 mark; Hank Aaron of Milwaukee and Willie McCovey of the Giants shared the National league home run title with 44 each and Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota slugged 45 to win in the American league; and Aaron (130) and Dick Stuart of the Red Sox (118) were the runs-batted-in leaders.

Pitching standouts were reliever Ron Perranoski of the Dodgers with an .842 winning percentage on 16 victories against three defeats and Whitey Ford of the Yankees, who was 24-7 for 774.

WARREN STAN WON ONE for the road and Stan Musial came to the end of it.

The two 42-year-old stars, who have dominated National league headlines for the last two decades, were back in their familiar roles Sunday to help close the regular major league season.

Spahn equalled his career high of 23 victories in a season when he pitched the 2 to 0 decision over the Chicago Cubs. It was the 350th victory of Spahn's career, his 62nd lifetime shutout and his six game strikeout enabled him to surpass 100 whiffs for the 17th consecutive year.

For Spahn, who has as little trouble beating time as he does other ball clubs, it truly appears that there's still a long road to come.

Musial has made his reputation at the other end of the pitcher's mound and he also has created a living legend. Stan (The Man) played his last ball game Sunday, ending an active career that started in 1938, and he went out with a run-producing single in the sixth inning.

His Cardinal teammates added the finishing touch to a memorable day by squeezing out a 3-2 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds in 14 innings.
