

Brookings Council Initiated at Event Held in Medford

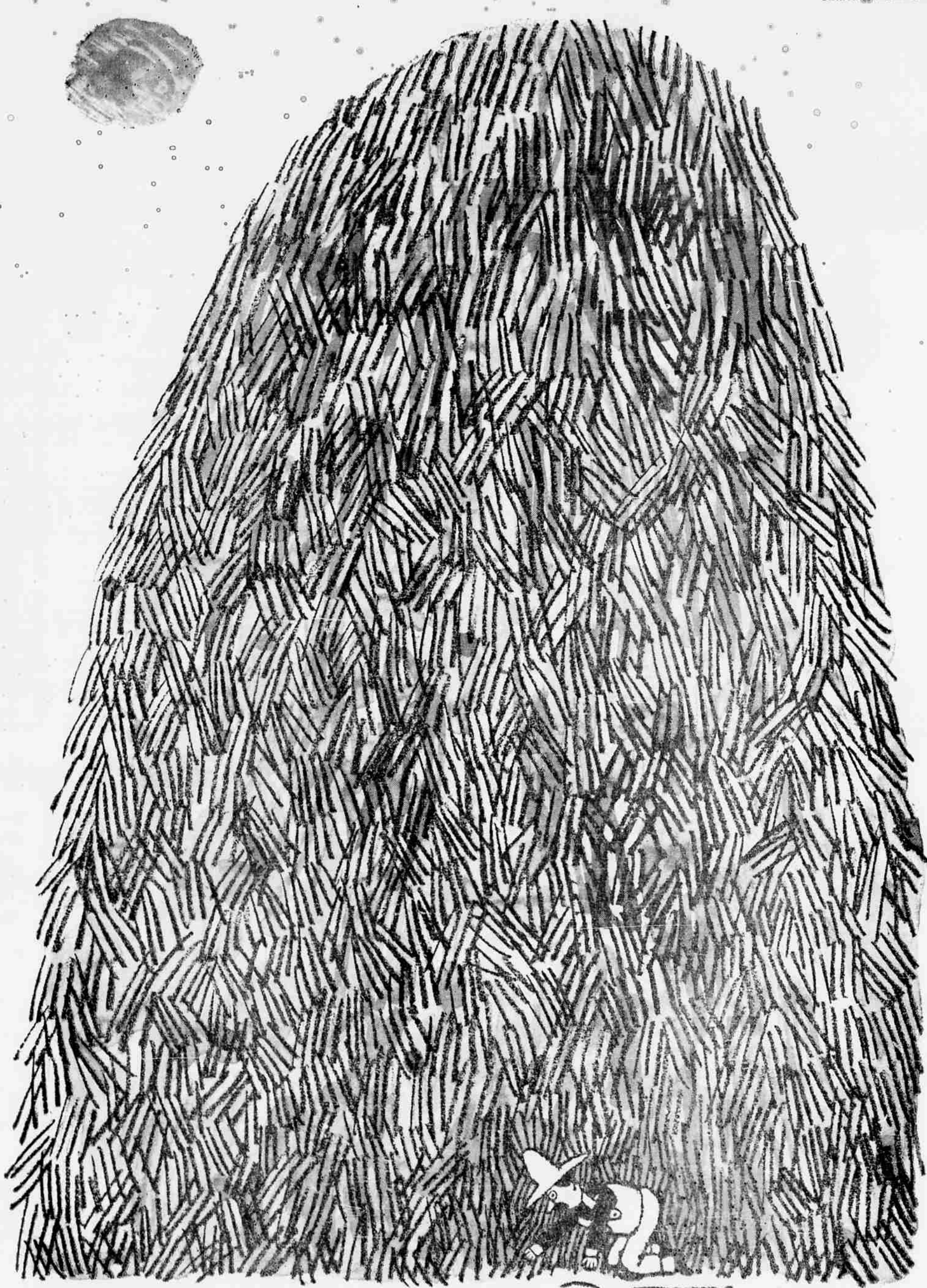
