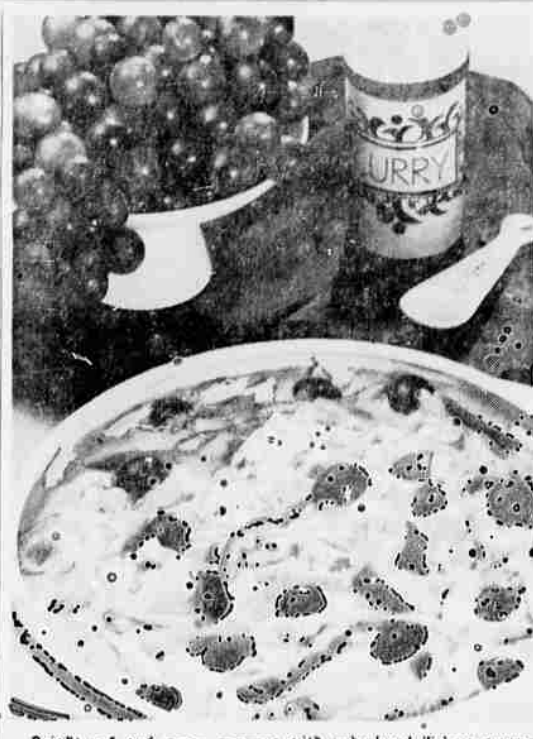
In addition to the functions scheduled here in observance of the national week, the Ashland Business and Professional Women's club has invited Medford members to a tea Sunday afternoon, October 6.

## Grapes, Peppers Add Color To Favorite Chicken Dish

Color is an important factor in foods, particularly if it is bright and lends itself to appetizing appeal. Treat your family to an old favorite all dressed up in red and green peppers with ruby-hued Tokay grapes for a regal touch, while this produce is on the fall market. Add curry powder for an exotic touch and you will have a main dish fit for a monarch but suggested for your next luncheon commitment.

Another point in favor of "Curry Chicken a la Queen" is that its cooking time totals 15 minutes, once the chicken has been cooked, and that could be prepared the day before, which is all to the good if you plan it for a luncheon dish.

**CURRY CHICKEN A LA QUEEN**  
One and one-half cup Tokay grapes; two cups diced, cooked chicken; two tablespoons butter or margarine; one-half teaspoon curry powder; one (10 1/2 oz.) can cream of celery soup; one-half

cup water; one-eighth teaspoon salt; dash pepper; one teaspoon lemon juice; one-half cup sliced green pepper; one-half cup sliced red sweet pepper; crisp toast points.

Halve and seed Tokays. Saute chicken in butter and curry powder until golden. Stir in soup, water, salt, pepper and lemon juice. Simmer 10 minutes to blend flavors. Add green and red peppers and Tokays. Simmer five minutes longer. Serve on crisp toast points or in flaky patty shells. Makes six to eight servings.

## Tours of Art Galleries Is Profitable Business

NEW YORK (UPI) — It took the League of Women Voters and the national boom in art to put two attractive young New York housewives in to a business which they thought would fill some of their spare hours. But a busy job for each Helen Kazian and Caroline Lerner has to be made; it's just that they've managed what so many women are deterred at learning art galleries.

The two, both wives of attorneys and mothers of two children each, operate Gallery Associates, Inc., which books group tours of New York's public and private museums and galleries, and characterizes their tours of famous collections along the Eastern seaboard.

The women met while both were active in the League of Women Voters and said their idea for the business evolved from conversations with a third mutual friend. The latter had been asked to think up some cultural tours in connection with the New York World's Fair in 1964-65.

When they first started, they confined the tours to New York. Now, they've branched to include bus visits to such as the Wadsworth Athenaeum in Connecticut, the Barnes Foundation in Pennsylvania, and Winterthur in Delaware. Eventually, they hope to ring in longer tours to assorted galleries and museums around the country.

The two do all the planning of the tours but leave the lecturing on site on the tours to experts they've lined up — art professors, art critics, curators and the artists themselves. Mrs. Lerner estimates that 1,500 persons have "passed through our hands" since their beginning two years ago.

They come from all parts of the country — conventional where the men bring their wives and the wife want something to do while they are at the hotel. Some are one of 10,000 last summer.

**Women's Work**  
They got more women gallery visitors than men, although "we find an increase in the number of married couples," said Mrs. Lerner. "Many mothers bring their teen-aged children."

Mrs. Lerner, 37, a straw-blond with blue eyes, said that most of her life had been spent in the art world.

"When I was eight, my mother started me on Saturday morning sketching classes at Parsons School of Design," she said. "I practically grew up there."

She majored in fine arts at Cornell university and after graduation worked in advertising departments of two New York retail stores, Bernard Graduate.

Mrs. Kaplan, 30, blue-eyed with brown hair, was a history major at Barnard college and worked in its vocational and guidance counseling department after her graduation.

The two believe the national boom in both gallery visiting and in art purchasing are the results of several factors.

"There's no doubt that there is an aura originating from the White House," said Mrs. Kaplan, referring to Mrs. John F. Kennedy's restoration project for the executive mansion.

Tourists to Europe come back to the United States with a new appreciation of art, said Mrs. Lerner. "They see history and culture centuries old," she added. "I think the result is that we're trying to make a deeper history for ourselves."

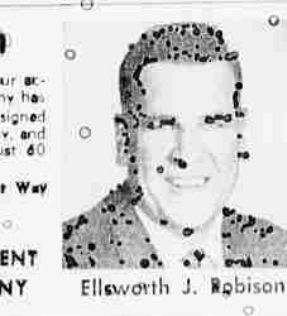
