77-Year-Old Man Retires From Soil

Ernest Santo, 77-year-old Luther Burbank of Lozier lane, Medford, is just about to wind up his career as a hybridizer.

He had a stroke about a year ago and has been unable to carry on much of his experimentation plus his processing of natural foods. But, he feels the work is important because it shows what can be grown on Rogue valley soils. It's also important because he feels his experiments provide new natural foods to keep people fit and healthy, particularly those with diet limitations.

Latest addition to the Santo plant menagerie is a climbing ever-bearing strawberry called Sonjara which came from Germany a few years ago. This berry, unlike the usual strawberries which bear the second year, bears the first year and produces a berry "as large as an egg."

He has another climbing strawberry variety, an American annual, which grows seven feet tall. The climbing varieties not only grow away from easy access by insects, but are easier to pick.

Another Santo propagation is the Jerusalem artichoke for diabetic people. And there are non-acid tomatoes for people with sensitive stomachs.

A hybrid raspberry produces a large unusually sweet berry as large as your thumb in spring and fall.

He also has a cross between a garlic and leek which produces a milder onion-type vegetable. The leek has five or six bulbs while the cross has only two large bulbs.

Santo has petite prunes, very small prunes, which have been growing 100 years or more in this country. Then there is the sweet date prune which shrinks less in the drying. He uses drying racks consisting of frames, which look like window screens, laid on benches in the sun or has them in a closet-like arrangement with a blower underneath.

Thick grape vines, thick as a man's arm, carry half-breed mission and concord grapes around an unused garage on the 1.6 acres of the Santo property. This cross produces grapes which dangle in clusters two feet long.

He also has red, white and blue plums. This is a cross between the cherry and plums. In fact, he has budded all three on one tree.

A red flowering crab apple crossed with a yellow Siberian crabapple produces fruit not too sour to eat. Usually the crabapple is too tart to eat fresh and is used almost exclusively in jams and jellies.
