Ducks Do It All In 1st Half Then Coast To 35-0 Victory

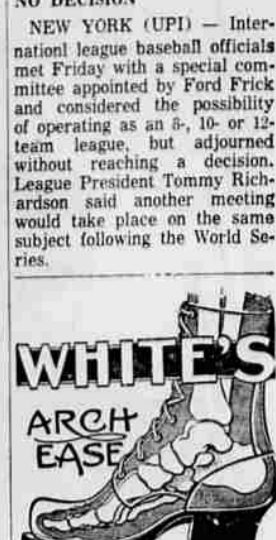
