Armando Rivera Portales, 26, of Mexico City, is leaving Medford today for home after studying the local lumber industry for four months.

He will return here in November after obtaining a resident visa from Mexico. Then he will return to the home of Keegan Townsend, 2912 East McAndrews rd., Medford. Townsend will continue to help him with his translations.

Portales has registered at the Medford High school to study beginning English, a d v a n c e Spanish and mathematics. He hopes to obtain a job in the lumber industry and attend adult night classes when he returns.

**Will Make Report**

When Portales completes his lumber industry studies he will make a report to Gilberto C. Rosas, president of Ponderosa De Durango, one of the largest Mexican lumber firms. There he hopes to continue in lumber industry administration.

The Mexican has seven brothers and one sister, all in some profession. His mother lives in Mexico City. He attended the University of Autonoma at San Luis Potosi in Mexico for four years and was a foreman at Industrias Forestales Campo Morado and Aserraderos del Pacifico, two lumber manufacturing firms in northern Mexico.

While a foreman, Portales discovered his native lumber industry lacked precision machinery to turn out a properly finished product.

**Watches Lumber Phases**

The young Mexican watched the different phases of lumber manufacturing at Kogap and Elk Lumber companies in Medford. He worked on the green chain for awhile to become better acquainted with the actual process. At night in the Townsend home, Portales would study diagrams of the various machinery with his host helping him with translations.

Before he left, the young Mexican expressed appreciation to the officials of the lumber companies who assisted him in his studies.

It was a telephone call from Medford police which brought the two men together. Portales had sought lodging at the Grand hotel in Medford but nobody could understand him. Someone called the police to seek an interpreter and the police in turn called Townsend. After becoming acquainted, the Medford man invited the young Mexican to stay with him.

### THE WEEK IN CALIFORNIA

## Senate Investigators Told No Organized Crime in State

California Attorney General Stanley Mosk told Senate investigators probing the shadowy crime syndicate Cosa Nostra that no organized crime existed in California.

Mosk said more than 100 suspected members of the syndicate lived in the state, but that the "free enterprise" nature of the illegal narcotics market tended to squelch any monopolistic tendencies of gangs.

This, Mosk said, was due to the fact that organized crime often was financed heavily by narcotics traffic but that California was so close to Mexico—a major source—that any racketeer could procure narcotics on his own.

Mosk conferred with investigators and Attorney General Robert Kennedy as the testi-

mony of Joseph Valachi began in a Senate hearing room.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

**Call girls:** Gov. Edmund G. Brown took the occasion of the "call girl" investigation to take another swipe at lobbyists, who he said had "gotten somewhat out of hand" due to "excessive entertaining and excessive expenditure of money" during legislative sessions.

Brown has long blamed lobbyists for the defeat of some of his major programs. On the "call girl" investigation itself Brown said it did not "produce any evidence." Brown said "We have a good legislature." He added, the "call girl situation was minor" compared to some of the bills introduced in the last session.

**Brown:** Gov. Brown had words on taxes, transit problems and the bombing of a Birmingham, Ala., church by race terrorists that killed four Negro girls.

Brown predicted in San Francisco that state services could be maintained at their current level without new taxes "for at least another year." He said he expected a \$101.7 million surplus at the end of the current fiscal period and nearly \$20 million at the close of 1964-65.

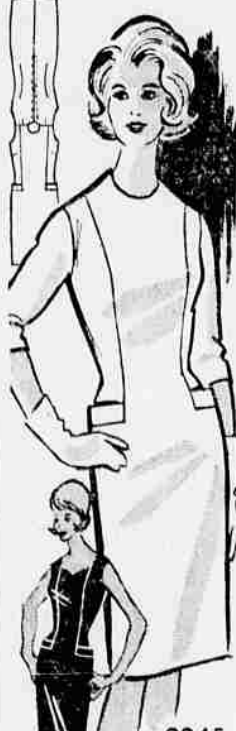
In Los Angeles, Brown described the mass transit problem as a "time bomb ticking away." He said he would offer his solutions to the legislature in January. He called transit problems and race relations "two challenges... of special and urgent importance." Earlier, Brown called on the governors of the 11 western states to help raise funds to rebuild the bombed Birmingham church. Brown is co-chairman of a national campaign to rebuild the church. He said Americans were "outraged and sorrowed at the senseless brutality" of the bombing.

**Hickey:** San Francisco 49er coach Red Hickey, a fixture with the NFL club for a decade, resigned after the team, reportedly unhappy with Hickey, lost its tenth straight game stretching back to last season. "I'm hoping they can salvage something out of the season... and don't think I'm down on football," was Hickey's parting statement, Hickey, whose "shotgun" formation made him famous for four games in 1960 and then collapsed, was replaced by 49er assistant Jack Christiansen.

**Water:** A new water plan designed to produce twice as much water as the state now uses and sufficient for the needs of the year 2020 was proposed by Gov. Edmund G. Brown. It went far beyond the present State Water Plan and ignored the Pacific South-West Water Plan proposed recently by Interior Secretary Stewart Udall. It would include major projects on the Eel, Trinity, Mad, Van Duzen and Klamath rivers and water not needed in northern counties would be shipped south. It would produce 12,000,000 million acre feet of water annually which Brown said was only 40 per cent of water now wasting into the sea.

**Digit dialing:** A group called "The Anti-Digit Dialing League," battling one of the latest trends of automation, won a preliminary victory over the Pacific Telephone company. The state public utilities commission issued a temporary restraining order preventing the telephone company from further conversion of its telephone numbers to all-numeral prefixes. The case is

MONMOUTH (UPI) — Gen. Herbert B. Powell, who retired in January after 39 years of military service, recalls that he went into the Army against the wishes of his father.

Gen. Powell told of his father's objections to his early Army service at a luncheon meeting honoring him here. He said his father had been led to believe that most Army officers drank and sometimes gambled.

Powell, now U. S. Ambassador to New Zealand, joined the National Guard and continued his military association with the ROTC when he attended the University of Oregon. This led to his appointment to a regular Army commission after his graduation. He retired with four stars.

## Pioneer Road Work Nearing Completion

Most of Pioneer rd. has been widened and surfaced except for a section for which the county needs a right-of-way through private property, County Engineer Robert J. Carstensen said Friday.

The area has been posted announcing that the county intends to acquire the right-of-way, Carstensen said.

When completed, the widening and asphalt surfacing will cover the entire length of road from Carpenter Hill rd. to Dark Hollow rd., the county engineer said. The remaining half mile probably will not be done this season, he said.
