### Zoning Ordinance Reviewed at C of C Meeting in Ashland

ASHLAND—A proposed new zoning ordinance now under consideration by the Ashland city council would create 11 different zones rather than the four currently in existence, the Ashland Chamber of Commerce was informed Tuesday.

- Mark Antony hotel. He displayed a map of the city showing the new zones and depicting how each piece of property in the city would be zoned under the proposed ordinance.
- The proposed zones are as follows:
- F-F: farm-forestry, designed for the hilly areas of the city not yet ready for development.
  - R-R: residential farm, for the areas on the east side of the city composed of farm land.
  - R-1: single family residential.
  - R-2: two family residential.
  - R-3: multi-family residential units.
  - C-O: for administrative and office uses.
  - C-1: neighborhood commercial.
  - C-2: retail commercial.
  - C-3: heavy commercial.
  - C-D: downtown commercial.
  - M: Manufacturing.

At present, a 1961 zoning ordinance is in effect, which establishes four types of uses: commercial, industrial, multiple dwelling and single family residential.

It was preceded by a 1946 ordinance, the first general one the city had, which also set up four districts: downtown business, marginal business, residential and industrial, Buchanan said. The Ashland planning commission was established in 1934. Between 1934 and 1946 it came up with some legislation but not an overall ordinance.

The latest proposal, Buchanan said, is designed to be more specific than any of its predecessors. It also has such specific objectives as providing for more off-street parking, developing a clustering of similar uses, beautifying the city and protecting certain areas set aside for commercial and industrial uses.
