

Jackie Visits Isle

LEFKAS, Crece (UPI)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy stopped on her cruise today at the private island of Scorpios, owned by Greek shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis, after weathering a storm at sea.

Onassis' luxury yacht Christina with Mrs. Kennedy on board dropped anchor between Scorpios Island and the island of Wefkas. The yacht, which had been scheduled to arrive Wednesday, met a fierce storm in the Ionian Sea.

From the Christina, Mrs. Kennedy could see 70 workers build-

ing a road on Scorpios, where Onassis is building a magnificent villa. He bought the island six months ago.

Wednesday night's storm had given way to calm seas and sunshine when the Christina arrived. It was the 10th time the glittering yacht had anchored off the island and the people of the fishing village of Nydra, facing the island, paid little attention.

SCOTS WON'T LET RED PLANE LAND
LONDON (UPI)—The Foreign Office said today it has refused permission for the Soviet airliner carrying Cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin to land in Prestwick, Scotland, for refueling. The request was refused because the Soviet Union does not allow similar reciprocal facilities for British planes.

EMPEROR FLIES TO BERMUDA
OTTAWA (UPI)—Ethiopian Emperor Haile Selassie flew to Bermuda yesterday after concluding a state visit to Canada.

ALGERIANS GET LOAN FROM RED CHINA
ALGIERS (UPI)—The Algerian government announced yesterday it had received the loan of the equivalent of \$50 million from Communist China. Algerian sources said the loan was interest-free.

PANAMANIAN PLANE CRASHES
MARSEILLE, France (UPI)—A Panamanian plane carrying a load of cattle crashed in the mountains north of here yesterday. All six crewmen were killed. The plane was carrying the breeding stock from Denmark to Cairo.

Big Three Ratify Nuclear Test Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States, Britain and the Soviet Union exchanged documents ratifying the nuclear test ban treaty here today and expressed hopes for further relaxation of the cold war.

The treaty, banning nuclear tests in the atmosphere, space and underwater, goes into effect today with similar exchanges of ratification in London and Moscow.

Church Heads Greeted At Portland Meeting
PORTLAND (UPI)—Civic leaders and church officials were welcomed here Wednesday night to the 51st session of the Oregon-Washington conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion church.

The session will run through Sunday.

Spokesmen paid tribute to Rev. T. X. Graham, pastor of the First Zion church, for his role in the fight for "equal opportunities" for Negroes.

President Kennedy was to issue a proclamation later formally declaring that the treaty is in force and is binding in all U.S. agencies.

The Moscow ceremony of deposit of the ratified copies of the treaty took place in the Spiridonovka Palace, a 19th century mansion where talks were held that led to the pact. The treaty was signed in the Soviet capital Aug. 5.

Tigard Boy Killed When Hit by Auto
NEWBERG (UPI)—Dale Douglas Davis, 4, Tigard, was dead on arrival at Newberg Community hospital late Wednesday after he was struck by a car near his home.

Oregon state police said the boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Allison, ran into the road and was struck by a car driven by Robert Leonard Bell, 25, Portland.

Bell said his vision was obscured by a dip in the road.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk called the treaty "a step which may open the way to other steps to reduce tensions and build a peaceful world."

Soviet Ambassador Antoly F. Dobrynin expressed on behalf of Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev the hope that it would lead to settlement of other disputes and "clear away, step by step," what he called the "roadblocks" to peace.

British Ambassador Sir David Ormsby Gore said he hoped the treaty would open the way to "a new and more hopeful chapter in the history of mankind."

Rusk, Dobrynin and Ormsby Gore each formally "deposited" a bound copy of their country's ratification at the State Department for safekeeping in a department vault.

They also signed a formal declaration the ceremony had taken place.

U.S. Ambassador Foy Kohler, acting for the United States and Sir Himphrey Trevelyan, the British envoy to Moscow, represented his country at the Moscow ceremony.

Aerial Tramway Not In Public Interest

PORTLAND (UPI)—An aerial tramway to carry sightseers from the Columbia River Highway in Oregon to Munra Point, high above the Columbia Gorge in Washington, is "not in the public interest," Mt. Hood National Forest Supervisor Paul Neff said Wednesday.

Neff said he had given his opinion to Lauren Lucas of Bonneville Aerial Tramway, Inc., which wanted to build the facility.

Neff indicated his action would kill plans to make a survey of the area and call for bids.

He said a tramway would not fit in with the recreational concept of the Columbia Gorge, and there was no public support for it.

Another plan to build a tramway between Crown Point and Rooster Rock also has drawn opposition from the Columbia River Gorge commission.

Police Team Up On Mercy Mission

DALLAS, Ore. (UPI)—Portland police and state police teamed up Wednesday in a mercy mission to rush medicine to a man suffering from a heart ailment here.

Dr. William Charles of Dallas found the patient needed a thrombolytic substance which dissolves a blood clot around the coronary artery—a medicine effective only if used within a few hours after the heart attack.

He could find none in nearby Salem, but located some in Portland. Police there picked it up and rushed it out to Barbur Boulevard to Capital highway, where state police picked it up.

Dr. Charles took the patient, Cecil Bookey, 48, Rickreall, off the critical list Wednesday night.
