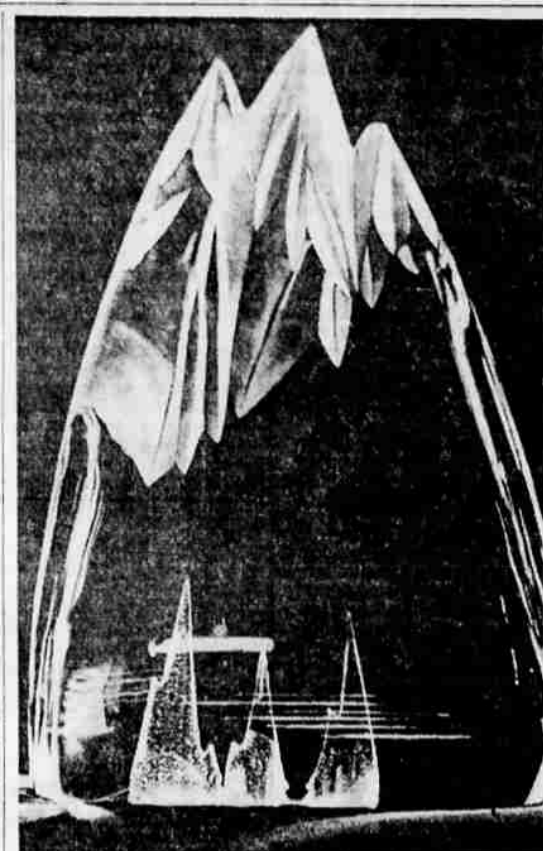

Funeral Services For Mrs. Hanley Slated in Seattle
 Funeral services for Mrs. Elizabeth Hanley, 78, widow of the late E. B. Hanley, a resident of Hanley Lands on Ross Lane, will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in Bonney-Watson's funeral parlor in Seattle.
 Mrs. Hanley died unexpectedly of a heart attack in the northern city Wednesday morning.
 She had lived most of her life in Seattle, where her husband, a member of the pioneer Oregon Hanley family, maintained his headquarters while engaging in mining and fishing industries in Alaska.
 The daughter of a Welsh mining engineer, Robert David Reese, Mrs. Hanley was born June 14, 1885, in Kansas, while her parents were temporarily located in a mining area.
 Educated in Portland, she was educated in Portland, the family's home city, graduating from St. Helen's Hall. In 1904, in Portland, she was married to Edward B. Hanley, who joined Jack Dalton in financing and engineering the Dalton trail into Alaska.
 During that period of early Alaska development Mrs. Hanley accompanied her husband into many of the mining and fishing areas and wrote a history of those experiences.
 She was throughout her life active in philanthropic and political endeavors. She was a member of the Republican party and during the 1916 campaign stumped the state of Oregon for Charles Evan Hughes.
 She also was active on the west coast in the women's suffrage movement. She was a co-founder of Pro America, which was originally a national association of Republican women. She was the Washington state representative to the Women's National Republican club for many years and was active in many conservation programs regardless of party lines.
 Active in Clubs
 Always active in garden clubs and gardening, Mrs. Hanley was a member of the Garden committee of the Children's Orthopedic hospital in Seattle. She also was on the editorial staff of the University of Washington Arboretum Bulletin.
 Following the death of her husband, she gave up her home in Seattle and came to make her permanent home at Hanley Lands in the early 1950s. She had always divided her time between the Seattle and southern Oregon areas, her husband being one of the owners of the Hanley donation land claim in Jackson county.
 Surviving are a son, Edward B. Hanley Jr., Seattle attorney; a daughter, Mrs. Kathryn Hieffernan, who had motored north with her mother this week; a grandson, Robert D. Heffernan Jr., Medford attorney; and two nieces, Miss Martha Hanley and Miss Mary Hanley of Jacksonville.
 Episcopal services will be conducted at the Seattle funeral home by the rector of St. Stephens church in Seattle. Cremation will follow the services.
