

Recommendation Accepted by GP

GRANTS PASS — The Grants Pass city council accepted the recommendation of the water commission to increase sewer connections from \$2 to \$3 per front foot, effective July 1, 1964, to bring charges into accord with increased construction costs. The action was taken at the Wednesday night meeting of the council.

A motion to consider legislation amending the zoning map to permit rezoning of property also was passed by the council. The property under consideration is owned by Dr. Harold E. Campbell, who had asked that it be changed from residential to limited commercial.

The council accepted the recommendation to proceed with the purchase of the W. T. Tracy property needed for the connection of two streets, Portola drive and Oriole street, in the southeast section of the city.

A hearing was conducted on a small extension of the sanitary sewer line on Northeast Eighth st. in the high school area. There were no objections voiced.

A report was made to the council by Norma Sergeant, administrative secretary for the city. It was one of a series planned this season to keep city council members better informed regarding the work of all departments and administrative employees.

Goldwater Lashes At Administration

BOSTON, Mass. (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R - Ariz., lashed out Wednesday night at President Kennedy and his administration as "a would-be king and a want-to-be dynasty, not a president and a party."

Goldwater, still denying he is a candidate for the GOP presidential nomination, told a Republican fund raising dinner that the Kennedy administration "deals freely with the enemy" and thereby "deals tragically with the hopes of freedom."

"Even the liberals have to recognize that what we have now in Washington is a would-be king and a want-to-be dynasty, not a president and a party," he charged.

Goldwater told the \$100-a-plate dinner audience that the Kennedy administration "speaks of peace while it misunderstands and undermines the strength which alone can keep the peace."

Salinger Urges Better Newspapers

NEW YORK (UPI) — White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger Wednesday deplored the trend toward fewer newspapers and urged the American press to improve its product through self-criticism.

Salinger made the comment in a speech to the New York chapter of Sigma Delta Chi.

Referring to this week's demise of the New York Mirror, formerly second largest newspaper in circulation in the nation, Salinger said:

"The question we must ask ourselves today is: How long are we going to be asked to serve as honorary pallbearers for dead newspapers instead of attempting a heavy dose of preventive medicine?"

He said the American press could not afford to "rest on its laurels" and said it must take "a hard look at itself" and innovate.

Leadership Crisis Not Only Challenge Facing Britain's Conservative Party

LONDON (UPI) — Solving their leadership crisis is only half the challenge confronting Britain's ruling Conservatives. The Conservative party's annual conference was dominated by the question of who should succeed retiring Prime Minister Harold MacMillan as party leader. But the Tories must also turn their attention to the important session of parliament opening Oct. 24.

Then, sometime in the next 12 months but generally expected to be next spring or summer, comes the general election.

The Labor opposition, front-

running in the public opinion polls, plans an all-out attack on the Conservatives when parliament resumes.

Liberals on Sidelines
Standing on the sidelines, ready to take advantage of any dissatisfaction among Conservatives over their party's internal wrangling, are the Liberals led by ambitious 59-year-old Jo Grimond.

The Conservative fight over MacMillan's successor thus hit the party at a critical moment.

At the last general elections in Oct., 1959 the Conservatives swept back into parliamentary power with a commanding majority of 100 seats over Labor.

It was their third electoral win in a row.

In the past two years, however, the party's political fortunes have sunk. By-election returns have confirmed the anti-Conservative trend.

Various factors have been held responsible for the decline — boredom with a party in power for 12 years, the Common Market setback, sex and security scandals, a wage squeeze that hurt the middle classes and high unemployment during last winter's severe freeze-up.

Taking Votes Away
The Liberals have set out to prove they are a party of responsibility with a Constructive role to play in shaping Britain's future. With only seven members of parliament, they must combat a tendency for supporters to drift away at election time to vote for candidates of the two major parties that have a real chance for power.

Grimond argues that Britain needs a party that can bridge the gap between the working class heritage of labor and the blue-blooded background of the Conservatives. In by-elections the Liberals have been taking votes away from Conservative candidates.

The Labor party is riding high. Its new leader, 47-year-old Harold Wilson, has established tight control over his colleagues.

For years, Labor divided between factions of left and right wing socialists, but now appears to be cohesive. The party has the important backing of the trade unions.

Wilson presents Labor as a party marching in time with modern trends. He cites the need for scientific revolution to keep Britain great.

The Conservatives, at Blackpool, made it clear they will base their drive for re-election on the claim that their record in office shows them to be a party of progress and prosperity.

The leadership issue apart, the critical test for the Conservatives will be the performance of the national economy in the months ahead but at the moment the economic and industrial indicators point to a period of boom. The Conservatives claim this is the pay-off for their handling of a difficult financial crisis that hit the country in 1961.

If they can unite quickly under new and popular leadership, and if economic conditions remain sound through winter, the Conservatives might be able to pull things off again. At the moment, most experts are doubtful.
