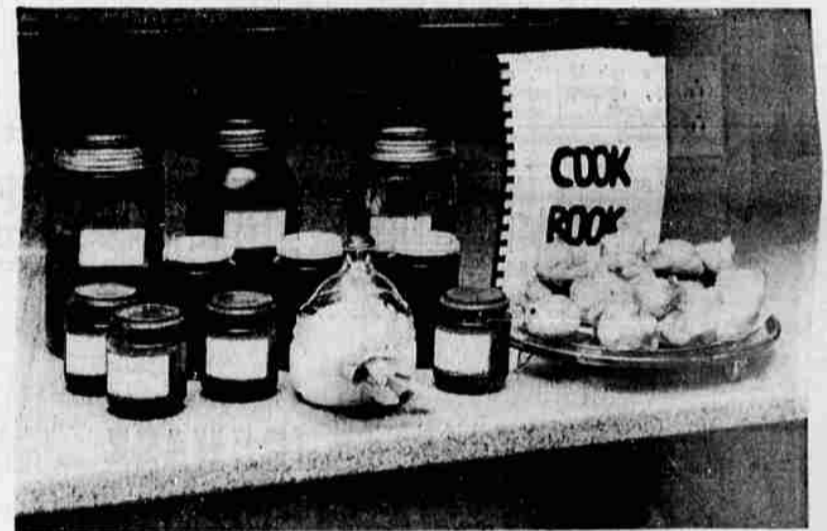

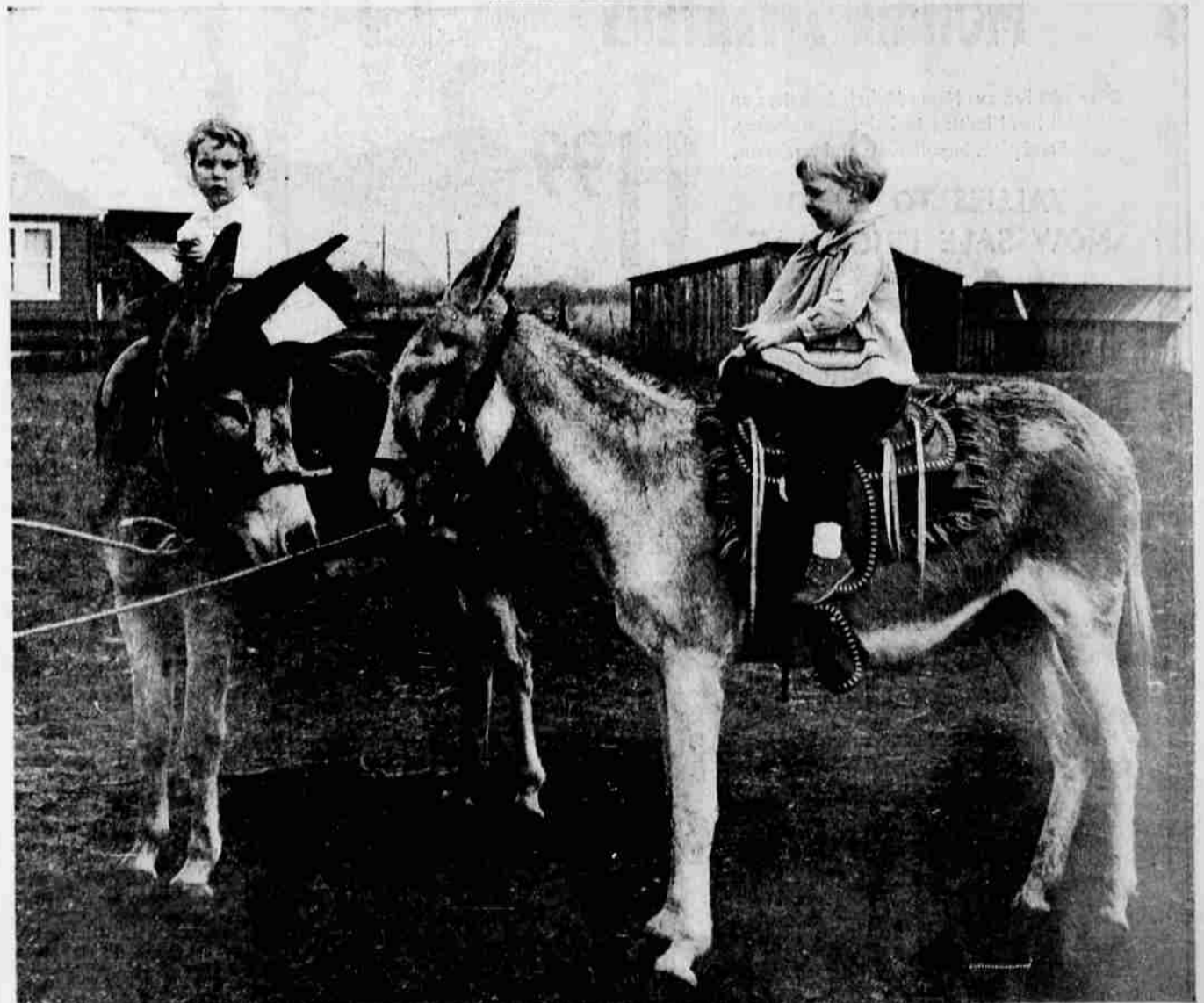
# Flea Market
