

Hardy Britishers Prepare Return To Tristan de Cunha

SOUTHAMPTON, England, (UPI) — A party of 198 men, women and children turned their backs today on the comforts of modern England to return to the rugged, simple life of Tristan de Cunha island in the South Atlantic.

They were scheduled to start the long voyage to "the loneliest island in the world" aboard the chartered Danish ship Bornholm.

The group was the main body of the island's total population, which was removed two years ago when a volcano eruption forced them to leave their tiny British-administered island.

When experts declared Tristan de Cunha once again safe for occupancy, the islanders voted overwhelmingly to return and the British government started making the necessary arrangements.

Siskiyou Sheriff Injured in Mishap

Siskiyou County Sheriff A. B. Cottar was reported in satisfactory condition at Rogue Valley Hospital today with facial injuries suffered in an auto accident late Wednesday.

According to deputies at the Siskiyou County sheriff's office, Cottar was driving on the Fort Jones Highway between there and Yreka about 9 p.m. when he came upon a herd of horses.

In the resulting collision Cottar suffered facial fractures and was scheduled to have surgery today. Two of the horses were killed.

He was taken to Siskiyou General Hospital in Yreka for treatment then brought to the hospital in Medford.

North Dakota Vote Seen Move for New Wheat Control Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The victory of Republican Mark Andrews in a special Congressional election in North Dakota this week may force the Kennedy administration closer to open support of a new voluntary wheat program.

Last May farmers voted in a nationwide referendum to reject the administration's mandatory wheat control program for their 1964 crop.

North Dakota farmers supported the program more strongly than growers in most other areas. About 65 per cent of the state's wheat producers voted in favor of the plan.

Critic of Plan

This week, however, voters in North Dakota's 1st Congressional District elected Andrews, who criticized the administration plan and advocated a voluntary control program.

Administration advisers have been reporting recently that wheat farmers generally still oppose mandatory controls and that they are likely to vote against such a plan again if another referendum is held.

Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman has not endorsed any move as yet for a new voluntary wheat program. He has been dropping broad hints, however, that he would back such a program if wheat farmers generally can agree on some new plan.

Republican Rep. Don Short of North Dakota said today that it was hard to interpret the special election in terms of what it foreshadows for agricultural policy in the 1964 general elections.

Not an Endorsement

Short said, however, that the election "certainly didn't indicate any endorsement of the Kennedy-Freeman policy."

Sen. Quentin N. Burdick, D-N.D., said he did not think farm policy was much of an issue in the special election. Sen. Milton R. Young, R-N.D., said he did not believe the election provided a clear-cut test on farm policy.

Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., offered another interpretation. He said the Democratic candidate in the special election, John Hove, was a political unknown running against a widely-known Republican. The fact that the Democrat did as well as he did showed substantial support for the Democratic program, McGovern said.
