Flea Market Continues; Congressman Opens Event

Hundreds of valley residents have flocked to the Junior Service League International Flea Market which opened Friday at noon for three days in the Medford Armory. Today's hours are from 1 to 5 p.m. League members assured that merchandise is being added daily as supplies become depleted.

During the opening ceremonies Friday a taped message from Congressman Robert Duncan served as a kick-off for the three-day event. Text of the message, stressing the meaning of internationalism, is reprinted here.

"Seldom can one community project such as this serve two purposes and serve them equally well. But the International Flea Market does just that. The first and most obvious, I suppose, is the financial support it gives to the charitable activities of the Junior Service League, and especially the fine work they have been doing for so long in the field of the child who is hard of hearing.

"But in addition, it serves to broaden the international horizons of the people of Medford and Southern Oregon, even as does the student exchange program, the sister city program (nurtured so carefully by former Mayor John Snider and our present Mayor James Dunlevy), the Peace Corps in which Frank Abers of Medford is now serving in Thailand, and other similar devices designed to help us know and be known better by our neighbors overseas.

"It is difficult to kill a person we know, it is difficult to war with a nation and a culture we know. Fear and suspicion can not flourish in an atmosphere of understanding and tolerance of and for other peoples, customs, and ways of life.

"More than our material resources, the nations of the world need our friendship and understanding to help to bring about a peaceful world. All this, these programs, including the International Flea Market, can help us obtain.

"Most of us will not have the privilege of a visit around the world. This is the next best thing. Enjoy it and know that it is worthwhile. Congratulations to the Junior Service League from Congressman Bob Duncan."
