HURRICANE GINNY
MOVING TO SEA
CAPE HATTERAS, N.C. (UPI)—Hurricane Ginny completed its frightening circle around the South Atlantic and moved eastward across the open sea today, still a "dangerous hurricane" but well out of reach of land areas.

And Helena, the season's eighth tropical storm which sprang up in the Caribbean during the weekend and showed signs of growing to hurricane proportions, degenerated into little more than squalls today and weather officials said it presented no immediate danger.

Ginny still packed the 85-mile-an-hour winds which kept residents of the Eastern Seaboard edgy all last week and forced removal of about 4,000 persons from the Carolinas coastline during the weekend.

But its remote position made it a threat only to shipping.

Nixon Denies Dark Horse Role

NEW YORK (UPI)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon has issued a denial of reports that he may be a dark horse candidate for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

"I have noticed a rash of statements about my intentions," Nixon said. "First I am not a candidate and there will not be a draft. I am not supporting or opposing any of those who have indicated they are candidates.

"I will support any one of those who wins the nomination in San Francisco (the site of the GOP convention)."

"Nixon made the comments on his return from a 10-day European trip on Saturday.

Oregon veterans should understand this thoroughly when disposing of their GI homes, Novotny emphasized.

The veteran may be released of the liability to the Veterans Administration if his loan is current and if the purchaser has obligated himself by contract to purchase his property and assume his liability.

In addition, the purchaser must satisfy the VA that he is a good credit risk.

A veteran planning to sell his GI home may take either of two steps to avoid future liability, Novotny said: (1) He can arrange for the GI loan to be paid in full; (2) He can allow the purchaser to assume his GI loan and obtain a release of his liability on the loan from the holder of the mortgage and the Veterans Administration, provided, of course, both agree.

Oregon veterans may apply to the VA for a release from liability by submitting a written request to Manager, Veterans Administration Regional office, 208 S. W. Fifth Ave., Portland.

The request should include the VA loan number if known (it is shown on the reverse of the certificate of eligibility), the address of the property, the name and address of the proposed purchaser, and the name and address of the holder of the mortgage, Novotny said.

PORTLAND - Merely selling his GI home does not relieve the veteran of his liability to the Veterans Administration, R. J. Novotny, manager of the Portland VA Regional office, said today.

Too often veterans who have sold their federal GI homes learn later that the buyer has defaulted on the loan, the mortgage has been foreclosed, a deficiency resulted and they are liable to VA for payment of the claim VA had to pay to the lender, he said.

Smith, Medford, is a director in the state organization; Bill Williams, Medford, is newsletter chairman; Harry Taylor, Medford, is president of the Jackson County Chapter; and Mel Atkins, Grants Pass, is president of the Josephine County Chapter.
