PORTLAND (UPI) — A group of Russian engineers appeared impressed Monday with what they saw when they toured power facilities and farms in Central Oregon.

"The problem of supplying electrical power to farms is much better taken care of in the United States than in my country," said Nikolay Chuprakov, deputy chairman of the state committee for power engineering and electrification of the Soviet Union.

Half a dozen Russians made the trip on a chartered bus as guests of Portland General Electric Co. They are in this country under auspices of the State Department and left for California today.

**Famed Pennsylvania
Station Undergoes
Complete Change**

NEW YORK (UPI) — It was a cross between a Roman bath and a Greek temple. Artists and designers for years had argued whether it was an architectural masterpiece or a monstrosity.

But for more than a half a century it had been a familiar landmark to untold millions of New Yorkers and visitors from all over the world.

Today the artistic merits or demerits of the world's busiest railroad station became academic.

At 9 a.m. Monday the first of the electric jackhammers started tearing into the stone and granite that formed the imposing facade of famed Pennsylvania Station.

The columned grandeur of the old building will no more, but the station will remain. It will be rebuilt from the ground up.

The underground railroad station will be topped by a 33-story modernistic skyscraper and a new \$70 million Madison

Square Garden sports center. The facelifting will be carried out despite protests from architectural devotees and others interested in preserving the 33-year-old landmark.

Officials of the Pennsylvania and Long Island Rail Roads, the construction and demolition firms and the head of the Madison Square Garden corporation watched as workers atop the main entrance stacked and trussed up one of the six stone eagles that have perched there since 1910.

A giant crane lifted the 5,700 pound eagle and then lowered it to the street where it glowered imperiously at the destroyers of its imperial nest.

The five other giant birds are scheduled to join it soon in a 31st Street parking lot for temporary storage.

The lower levels of the station still will serve 200,000 passengers on 550 daily trains. The train service will continue during the demolition and new construction.
