

# Hayes Gets UPI Honor This Week

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI) — He's known for winning the big ones around the rugged Big Ten but when his back is to the wall—look out.

He's the dean of Big Ten football coaches, and his teams have dominated the league for 13 seasons. He has an edge over every opposing team in the conference except Minnesota, which Ohio State has not met during the "Woody years."

He's Wayne Woodrow Hayes, the outspoken, hard-losing coach at Ohio State, who was named "Coach of the Week" for the Buckeyes' rousing 13-10 upset over second-ranked Wisconsin last Saturday.

The victory was a complete turnaround for Ohio State, which had been crushed the week before at Southern California. But that's when Hayes is the most dangerous—with his back to the wall.

Players Count Most "There have been only two or three times in the last years we've lost two in a row," Hayes said. "But the important statistic is if the kids can fight their way back after a humiliating defeat. It's the boys that come back to win that make a fine team."

His pride battered after the humiliating 32-3 defeat, his worst as a coach, Hayes asked each of his players to write a critique of what would do the most good in getting ready for Wisconsin.

He also did a little thinking on his own and came up with a trump card—Tom Barrington, a 205-pound quarterback who nearly lost his life last summer in an industrial accident.

Hayes closed the doors to the practice field and drilled Barrington long and hard. He had been idle since last spring from the shattered jaw that forbade any contact work whatsoever.

"We felt it would be a good advantage to us if the opposition didn't know about Barrington," Hayes said.

Barrington was kept off the field at Wisconsin until the squad came back to start the game. He was not listed on the traveling roster.

Provided Lift "Although they might have had some premonition about it, they weren't sure of it," Hayes said.

Primarily a runner, Barrington gained 58 yards in 16 carries, but his lift was psychological more than anything else.

It took displaced quarterback Don Unverforth to provide the passing that set up the winning touchdown in the final three minutes.

"Maybe it's healthy to stick a boy on the bench," Hayes smiled.

During the "Woody years" in the Big Ten, 1951 to 1963, Ohio State has compiled a 58-18-6 record. Although the Buckeyes have not played Minnesota in that time, the best any of the other eight have done is Iowa with five wins and six losses.

Earlier this season, Hayes became the winningest coach in Ohio State history, surpassing 78 wins posted by the late Dr. John W. Wilce compiled from 1913 to 1928. He is now 81-27-7 going into this week's Iowa game.

Edie Cotton Strengthens Bid FLINT, Mich. (UPI) — Scatlet's Edie Cotton strengthened his bid for a shot at the light heavyweight title held by Willie Pastrano Tuesday night by left-jabbing his way to a 15-round unanimous decision over Henry Hank.

Cotton, ranked as the No. 1 challenger to Pastrano, won the Michigan version of the light heavyweight crown before a meager crowd of 455 persons.

There were no knockdowns during the battle.

Cotton was never in trouble except in the ninth round when he was staggered by Hank's overhand right, but he managed to jab his way out of trouble.

Hank won 54 fights, lost 18, and fought to three draws. Cotton, has a 48-14-1 career record including 21 knockouts. He has taken the count only once.

Referee Jack Stein had Cotton winning 149-144. T. Ray Johnson of Flint scored it 148-137 in Cotton's favor and Francis Shepherd gave it to Cotton, 146-140.

Conrad, Randle Record Bound NEW YORK (UPI) — The St. Louis Cardinals' pass-catching pair of Bobby Joe Conrad and Sonny Randle are heading for a National Football League record and so is the Chicago Bears' defensive backfield.

Conrad and Randle have combined to catch 70 passes and if they continue this pace they will break the season two-man record of 126 set by Tom Fears and Elroy (Crazy Legs) Hirsch of the Los Angeles Rams in 1950.

The Bears have intercepted 22 passes so far this season and at this pace could surpass the team mark of 42 set by the Green Bay Packers in 1942.

The Cardinals regained the NFL total offense lead this week and remained the No. 1 passing team by a wide margin, according to the latest statistics released today. The Cleveland Browns remain tops in rushing.

There were no changes among the defensive leaders, the Detroit Lions remaining first in total and passing defense and the Green Bay Packers staying atop in rushing offense.
