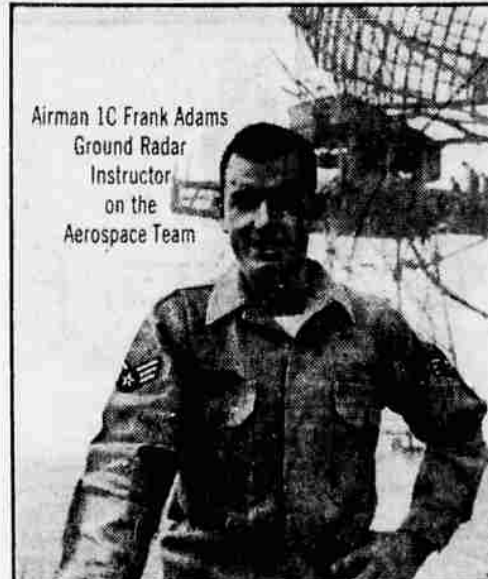

USC, Washington Lead Big Six Stats

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Southern California and Washington, who meet in a head-on grid battle Saturday in Seattle, dominate latest Big Six team statistics.

The Trojans are the defensive kings, having given up only 242 yards per game. Their pass defense is among the nation's best, having yielded a scant 61 yards per contest.

Washington has the best attack with 321 yards per game and has rushed for 225 yards per contest to lead that department, too. The Huskies also have given up 194 yards per game rushing, lowest in the league.

California, with quarterback Craig Morton leading the way, has the best pass offense with an average of 158 yards per contest.

Plans for Expansion Of Ashland Library Reviewed at Meeting

Ashland's plans for library expansion and a review of Josephine county's approach to construction of the new library, which has been serving that area since 1959, were presented to Friends of the Public Library of Medford and Jackson County at the meeting in Medford Monday night.

Miss Cora E. Mason, Ashland librarian, presented the program now under way there, and Mrs. Florence Moberly, Grants Pass, Josephine County librarian, described the early planning done by city and county before the new library was constructed.

The city of Ashland has purchased two additional lots adjacent to the present library for expansion. A feasibility study was made by Vincent L. Oredson, architect, who was retained by the city. This study has been accepted and the architect has now been asked to bring in a preliminary plan for the new building.

19,500 Square Feet If the construction develops as now visualized, Miss Mason said, the Ashland library will have 19,500 square feet of use space. The building which will be attached to the present library will add 10,000 square feet to the facility.

Some of the problems which now exist at the Ashland Library, and are to be corrected in the new construction, are too many steps, inefficient arrangement of work and study areas, and inadequate parking space, Miss Mason said.

The new structure will have a graduated ramp as approach and entrance to the building, which will have one major floor with surrounding mezzanine, and parking on the roof.

The old building will be used as the auditorium and children's department.

No Time Table No time table has been set up for the construction, Miss Mason stated after displaying the various charts prepared by the architect. A bond issue will be required to finance the proposed program, estimated cost of which is \$300,000, she said.

The Josephine County Library was financed by the county with O and C funds, Mrs. Moberly said, so no bond issue was required to obtain the \$361,000 represented in the construction. The site was chosen by a joint committee of county and city planners, who made a study of the area to determine the most desirable location and then obtained it, Mrs. Moberly said.

Gives Resume Omar Bacon, local librarian, gave a short resume of the crowded conditions of the Public Library of Medford and Jackson County, pointing out that the same problems, which Josephine county has corrected, and that Ashland plans to correct, are also plaguing Medford. He mentioned specifically the entrance steps, crowded reading space and crowded book space. The branch circulation room, he said, is presently jammed.

The meeting, over which Harry Chipman, president of the Friends of the Library, presided, was adjourned for a refreshment and social hour for which Mrs. George Moore was hostess.
