

Kennedy to Test Atmosphere in Quaker State

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy tests his political potency tonight by speaking at a \$100-a-plate Democratic dinner in Philadelphia five days in advance of state and city elections.

Kennedy invited Philadelphia's Democratic Mayor James H. Tate to ride with him in a motorcade through the city during the evening rush hour in an obvious effort to clinch Tate's reelection Tuesday.

Republican attorney who has received strong backing from Pennsylvania's Gov. William W. Scranton, a GOP presidential possibility.

The quick trip also gives Kennedy a chance to gauge public reaction to his triumph in getting House Judiciary Committee approval of a compromise civil rights bill. Philadelphia is the type of big, industrial city with a large Negro population where such legislation is considered most popular.

Kennedy was due to leave nearby Andrews Air Force Base at 4:30 p.m. EST for the 30-minute flight to Philadelphia International Airport. A motorcade to the downtown section of the city, a reception and private dinner were to precede his appearance at a convention hall (about 8:45 p.m. EST). He planned to return to Washington immediately after his speech.

The President, who received Pennsylvania's 29 electoral votes in 1960, apparently was trying to preserve Democratic control of the state's biggest city to keep the Keystone State in his column in 1964.

Kennedy carried Pennsylvania by a majority of 116,000 in 1960 and rolled up a 330,000-vote margin in Philadelphia. In 1962, however, Scranton carried the state by 400,000 in the gubernatorial race against former Philadelphia Mayor Richardson Dilworth.

Rep. William J. Green Jr., D-Pa., boss of the Democratic party in Philadelphia, has predicted an "impressive victory" for Tate "in preparation for a Kennedy victory in 1964."

WALKING AND BLOOD PRESSURE

Q. I have high blood pressure. I walk to and from work. Is walking bad for the blood pressure?

A. Walking brings into play many adjustment mechanisms, especially with regard to the blood vessels. The effect of walking at a moderate pace on existing high blood pressure would probably be slight. However, strenuous exercise might override the adjustment mechanisms and cause harm. It is well to keep in mind that mild exercise is generally a stimulant to circulation and a basic body function.

PUBERTY PROBLEM

Q. What can be done for a 14-year-old boy whose breasts have begun to enlarge? He is very self-conscious about this.

A. Breast enlargement at puberty is said to occur in about 80 per cent of boys. In most cases the enlargement is scarcely noticeable. A medical examination is called for when the enlargement is pronounced. Treatment may or may not be in order.

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Halt to Misuse Of Federal Power Urged by Solon

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Oliver P. Bolton, R-Ohio, urged President Kennedy today to "halt misuse of government power" by cabinet members who engage in campaign solicitations.

In a letter to the President, Bolton renewed his attack on Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, who the congressman charged "committed a most serious breach of public trust" by seeking campaign donations from lobbyists and trade association representatives for a dinner honoring Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., D-N.J.

Bolton also told Kennedy that "friends of Ralph Yarborough" held a fund-raising dinner at Austin, Tex. for the Democratic senator at which Postmaster General John J. Gronowski was scheduled to speak last week. Bolton said letters were sent to postal employees from "a top official in the Texas regional post office urging them to attend as an opportunity to pay tribute to a friend of the post office department." He referred to Yarborough.

SEGREGATION EXTENSION URGED
CAPE TOWN, South Africa (UPI)—The Cape Provincial Council has asked the government to extend racial segregation boundaries a half-mile into the ocean at a number of seaside resorts.

The boundaries, to be measured from high-water mark, presumably would prevent all interracial swimming. The request, reported yesterday, provided that a member of one race could rescue a member of another race who was in danger of drowning.

IRISH SELL PLANE TO NEPAL
DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI)—Irish Airlines announced today it has sold a DC3 plane to the Royal Nepal Airlines which will use it to fly sightseers over Mt. Everest. The craft was once the property of the U.S. Air Force.

The Dakota plane left Dublin yesterday for Katmandu where it will be put into service for the tourist runs over the world's tallest mountain.

WINNER'S CHARACTER DETERIORATES
CAPE TOWN, South Africa (UPI)—The wife of a man who won \$140,000 in a sweepstakes complained to the Supreme Court yesterday her husband's character deteriorated in the seven months since the windfall.

PERON EXTRADITION ASKED
BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—Argentina will ask Spain to extradite ousted ex-President Juan D. Peron on charges of statutory rape involving the teenager who Argentine authorities say became his mistress after his wife Eva died in 1952.

The Court of Criminal Appeals decided yesterday to press the charge, which has been on the books since 1956.

Blustery Winds Whip Snow Across North New England

Blustery winds whipped snow across northern New England today. Three Northeastern states eased drought-imposed restrictions on the use of woodlands but North Carolina barred 26 counties to hunters.

Up to one foot of snow fell in Maine Tuesday and during the night. Hurricane Ginny dumped more than 2 1/2 inches of needed rain along the New England coast.

All restrictions on the use of forests were cancelled in Maine and Massachusetts. New Hampshire's ban was lifted either totally or partially in seven counties.

North Carolina Gov. Terry Sanford banned hunting, camping, fishing and trapping in woodlands of 26 western counties effective today.

While Tuesday's rains eased the fire threat in parts of the northeast and along the fringes of the eastern lakes, most of the drought area had no relief. A forest fire raged out of control on the border between
