On the agenda are election of officers for the coming year, reading of the annual report, and presentation of awards, as well as a brief talk by Dr. Alvin Roberts. Dr. Roberts will speak about his experiences as a missionary doctor in Hamadan, Iran.

Mrs. Mayfield points out that this is the first time since the auxiliary was organized nine years ago, that the annual meeting for election of officers and presentation of awards has been held in November.
