The visitor's other children are Dieter, a medical intern in Germany; Wilhelm, who is in business, and Hanna, who is a Lutheran deaconess. Her son here is a forester with the Bureau of Land Management. The German visitor enjoys music, literature and fine arts and has so far attended the Portland Symphony concert, Erick Friedman and the Don Cossack Chorus and dancers performances.
