Harold A. — My son wants to drop out of school and I can't blame him. Joseph A. — You should do all in your power to talk him out of it. Harold A. — My brother keeps warning me not to let Frank quit high school, but he should be the last to object. He and I both got along fine without that diploma. Frank is 16 and bored stiff with history, poetry, and other subjects that won't help him earn a living. Since he has no interest in qualifying for college, he wants to get started at the service station. He's been offered a job as an attendant.

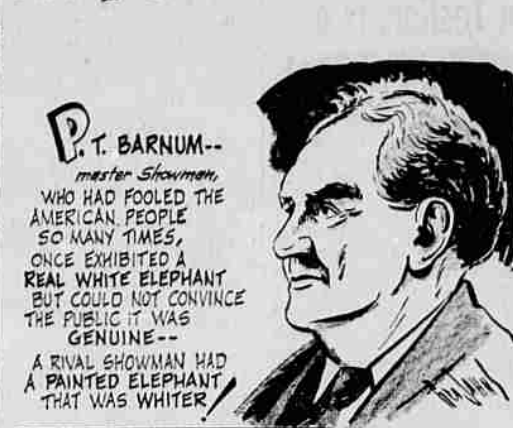
Joseph A. — This is when a kid needs a firm father. Things have changed since Hal and I were boys. Nowadays anyone without a high school diploma is considered "unskilled." He has terrific time competing with well-educated workers, as well as with automation. Instead of encouraging Frank to end his schooling, Hal should harp on the benefits, like learning to think and getting well-rounded and well-grounded.

The Council: For now, Harold, accept that Joseph's right and do your darndest to help your son through history, poetry, biology—even though they aren't his interests. For he will use them (or their effect upon him) both in making a living and in living. Space forbids our listing the dozens of arguments for staying in school, advanced by employers and unions and youth workers. One U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics item will suffice: four years of high school may yield a higher annual wage than 20 years of unskilled work. We'd rather discuss the Great Day-a-comin' in American schools if Frank will but hold his horses. Around the corner is better teaching aimed at holding interest. Think what tape-recorders will do for music class or

language drill. How about those overhead projectors which will take the place of slow "passing around"? And a California high plans to allow long periods for gym (including showers) and short ones for Oral English.

Senate Debates Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate opens its third week of debate on its \$3.7 billion foreign aid bill today with the threat of possible stern tactics to speed action on the long delayed measure. The bill, which would authorize another year of military, economic and technical assistance abroad, now totals only about \$240 million more than the House voted and almost \$800 million less than President Kennedy asked.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI) — South Viet Nam's Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu had airline reservations to go to Rome today for a reunion with her three younger children. But the former first lady of the troubled Asian nation complained of feeling ill late Monday and whether or not she makes the trip hinged on the diagnoses of the Beverly Hills doctor who was called in to see her. Dr. John Sharpe was called to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Chase where Mme. Nhu and her 18-year-old daughter, Le Thu, have been staying. Her hosts said she "felt very, very tired and weak."

DEATH TOLL DOWN

WASHINGTON (UPI) — During the past 20 years, the rate of accidental deaths among children and youths under 20 had been reduced by some 20 percent, reports Anthony J. Celebrezze, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. In 1942, for example, for every 100,000 young people in the population, 43 died as a result of accidents. In 1962, the rate had been reduced to 31 per 100,000 children.
