

Ullman Believes Tax Cut Bill Needed to Stimulate Economy

WASHINGTON — Rep. Al Ullman is confident that the \$11 billion tax cut will set the Nation's cash registers jingling

and the economic growth rate pulse tingling, but he isn't too happy with those who say they don't want the tax cut without drastic cuts in federal spending, particularly with regard to education.

Ullman is a member of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee and a fervent advocate of the tax cut bill as urgent and necessary to stimulate economic growth.

"We are at the point of diminishing returns and can't push them any higher. But the educational needs are becoming more pressing and more expensive — witness our troubles in Oregon."

Oregon State legislature and Gov. Mark Hatfield for cutting educational needs from the State budget, particularly community colleges which he feels is "the greatest need in the whole American educational system today."

Ullman agreed with the thesis of economist Charles Killingsworth of Michigan State University who has stirred interest in Washington with his "bottleneck" theory of the need to invest in human beings to provide for highly-educated workers.

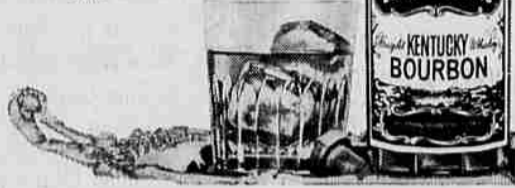

Rally Parade Scheduled

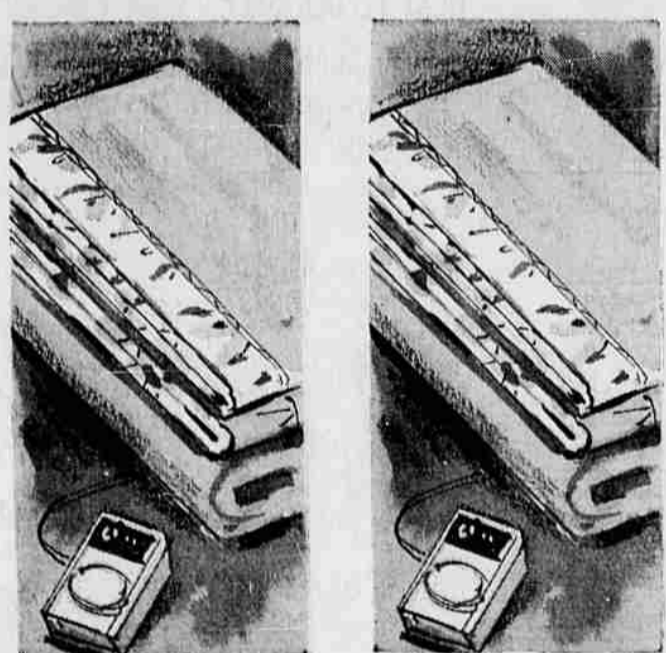
A rally parade will be held on campus at 6:30 p.m., Friday, followed by the annual bonfire on the Intramural Field.

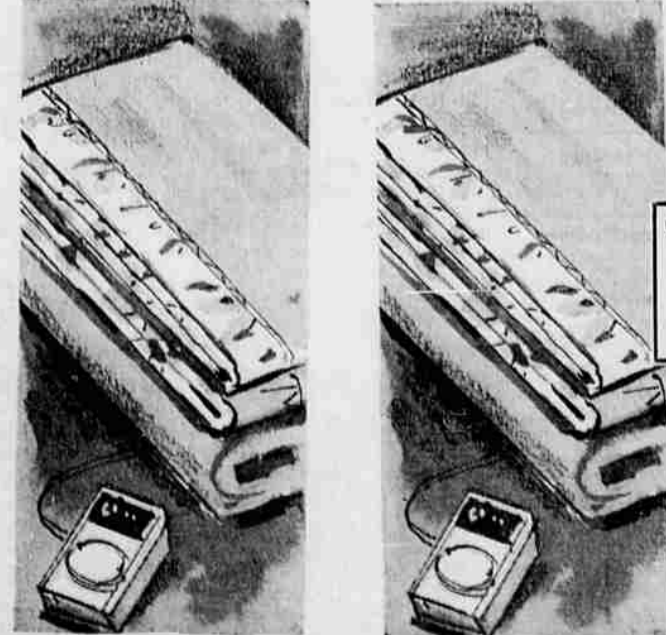
Homecoming festivities for 1963 will conclude with a concert by the University Singers, 2 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 24, in the student union fishbowl.
