

San Antonio Residents Shaken as TNT Containers Explode

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI)—Tons of TNT exploded in a concrete bunker at the Medina nuclear weapons plant Wednesday, panicking residents into believing it was an atomic blast.

After the original shock of the explosion, which staggered pedestrians and blew out store windows in downtown San Antonio 12 miles away, people panicked and fled in every direction from the plant.

Roads outside the site were clogged with bumper-to-bumper traffic and a huge black cloud from the explosion drifted slowly over the area.

People as far as 50 miles away called to ask what had happened.

Inside the plant confines, officials were already piecing together details of the blast and

checking for radioactivity. It was soon determined that a concrete storage bunker containing 13 to 20 tons of TNT had exploded while three men were loading containers of the stuff into the bunker.

Suspect Gives Police Paddy Wagon Problems

NEW YORK (UPI)—Arresting suspected forger Falco Barone, 30, was no trouble for police Wednesday but getting him to the station house was a weighty problem.

Barone, who weighs 441 pounds, and has a 60-inch waist, couldn't fit through the back door of a patrol car.

Two policemen, shoving a n.d. pulling finally managed to squeeze him into the front seat.

The men, Floyd T. Lutz, Marvin J. Ehlinger and Hillary F. Huser, all of San Antonio, saw a flash in one of the containers and dived into a ditch across the road from the bunker. Two of the men suffered superficial injuries. All three were given the day off.

Security Chief Loses Jewelry To Thieves

LONDON (UPI)—Lord Willington, head of Britain's biggest private security force, reported today that thieves stole \$14,000 in jewelry from his hotel room.

Willington heads Securicor, a company that operates 400 armored cars to guard the property of hundreds of business firms.

Soviet Union Getting No Special Privileges In Negotiating Wheat Deal With United States

(Continued from page 1) Wheat: Kennedy said he does not know what the outcome will be of negotiations for sale of U.S. surplus wheat to Russia. These are commercial negotiations, he noted, and said the United States is giving the Soviet Union no more privileges than would be given any friendly country.

Security: He justified new grounds of national security new travel restrictions which the State Department imposed this week on diplomats from five eastern European Soviet satellite countries. These safeguards, the President said, were deemed necessary to protect the security of U.S. defense sites.

Oil: To a question about Argentine threats to take over American-owned oil companies, the President said this government was concerned about the question of adequate compensation for the companies and that this issue was a subject now in negotiation.

Medical: The President said he believes his medical care bill ultimately would get out of committee and reach a vote in the House—but not necessarily this year. He said he was looking forward to the "delivery" in this Congress but it might not come this year. He said this was likely to be "an 18-month delivery."

Barghoorn: Asked whether Russia's arrest of Yale Prof. Frederick Barghoorn would affect negotiations to sell U.S. surplus wheat to Russia, Kennedy replied that to some extent the wheat deal "stands on its own," because it is of economic benefit to both Russia and the United States. But he said such trade between the two countries "depends on a reasonable atmosphere" in overall relations

between them. And he added that this atmosphere has been "badly damaged" by the Barghoorn case.

Convoys: Kennedy said more "difficulties" with the Soviets, like their interference with Allied military convoys on the autobahn to West Berlin, may be expected.

Recognition: The President said that delay in recognizing new governments of the Dominican Republic and Honduras resulted from lack of assurance that a constitutional form of government would eventually be established in either nation.

Foreign Briefs

AIRPORT GROUND PERSONNEL STRIKES IN FRANCE. PARIS (UPI)—Airport ground personnel went on a one-day strike here today but an Air France spokesman said nearly all long-distance flights would leave on schedule. The airline canceled one flight from Paris to New York. The walkout also cut deeply into domestic flight schedules.

SOLID FOUNDATION FOR LEANING TOWER SUGGESTED. MILAN, Italy (UPI)—An Italian engineer suggested here Wednesday night that the famed Leaning Tower of Pisa be jacked up while a more solid foundation is slipped under it. Prof. Gustavo Colonnetti said in a lecture here that the tower, which is leaning a bit more each year, may topple "within a few decades."

OCEAN-BOTTOM VOLCANO ERUPTS OFF ICELAND. REYKJAVIK, Iceland (UPI)—An ocean-bottom volcano began erupting this morning about four miles southwest of the Westman Isles of the southern Icelandic coast. No damage was reported but steam and smoke rose 600 feet into the air.

CHOLERA TAKES HEAVY TOLL IN INDIA. NEW DELHI (UPI)—More than 1,500 persons in three states have died from cholera so far this year, health officials said today.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stocks today were narrowly mixed. CBS jumped nearly 3/4 on a 2-for-1 stock split, dividend boost and record earnings. General Precision, which has broken off merger talks with Magnavox eased nearly 1/2. Magnavox was up roughly a point. Motors were sharply lower. Chrysler and American Motors were down around 1 1/2 apiece and Studebaker and General Motors eased fractionally. Union Carbide topped about 2 1/2 in an irregularly lower chemical group.
