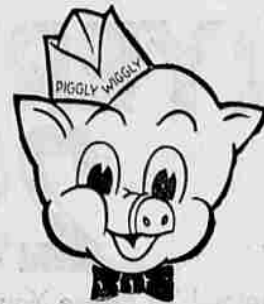

### Child Population Up Since 1960 By 4 1/2 Million

NEW YORK — The number of children under 18 years of age boomed in the United States to a record total of nearly 69 million by the middle of this year and may grow an additional 18 million by 1980, state statisticians of Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. have reported.

Although the new record represents a 4 1/2 million increase since 1960, the recent rate of growth in the child population has lessened appreciably from that in the 1950s. During that decade the group increased by more than 17 million — a rise without precedent in our history.

**Increase Smaller**  
The statisticians estimated that as a result of the upsurge in births following World War II, the numbers of children at 15-17 years of age will grow by 38 per cent from 1960 to 1970. But because of a leveling off in the number of births in recent years, smaller rates of increase are in prospect at the younger ages, the statisticians said.

Mortality in childhood continued at a very low level, although some important health problems remain at those ages. Of special importance are the acute conditions, particularly respiratory diseases, and injuries, which are relatively frequent among children, the statisticians concluded.

Respect for Law Makes Democracy Live

### JURY DUTY

Today as yesterday, our jury system is under fire. Critics say that juries waste time, that people don't want to serve, that jurors make stupid mistakes. Let the experts administer justice, some critics say.

These criticisms hold true only if citizens forsake their right to serve, or if they do not do their level best to reach just verdicts.

**Some Shirk Voting**  
We'd like to do our duty, of course, but it is hard to break up our routine of pleasant living. As citizens some of us shirk voting and some try to get out of jury service.

Perhaps we don't value our freedoms enough. We inherited them and didn't earn them the hard way.

Only a free people can enjoy the privilege of jury duty. An ancient philosopher once said that the mark of a citizen, as opposed to an alien, is his right to take part in the administration of justice.

**Follow Intelligence**  
When jury duty calls, think of yourself as a juror seeking truth, hearing all the evidence, and heeding the court's instructions. Follow the lawyers' arguments and lay aside prejudice and follow your intelligence and not your emotions.

Respect your fellow jurors, as they must respect you. In tolerance try for agreement, but never a verdict which violates the court's instructions or finds as a fact what you know is untrue.

When they call you to jury duty make a liar out of the critics. Be a good juror and make our system of justice work.

### Wool Responds

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — Clothing and textiles specialists at the University of Nebraska said wool responds well to a minimum of care and that it just takes a little "know-how" to keep it looking fresh and neat.

The know-how includes such simple things as knowing how to hang, air, brush and press wool.

Wool garments should be hung on a well-shaped hanger, preferably of the wooden or padded type, the specialists said.

Other tips offered: avoid crowding garments together in a closet; allow room to permit wrinkles to fall out; brush frequently to remove dust particles; and dry-clean or wash woollens before they become too soiled.

### Old Cowboy Still Has Lots of Bounce

PAMPA, Tex. (UPI) — At 95, he can't race across the range on a horse any more, but one old cowboy here still has a lot of bounce.

A. B. Melton, whose hip was broken by a calf in a loading chute at the age of 88, makes up the loss of his horse by bouncing and turning somersaults on a trampoline every day.
