New Light Shed On Hangover Cure

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Last month I gave readers of this column an exclusive report on a new hangover cure discovered by a New York advertising man.

To recap briefly he drove away the evil spirits by going out on the prairie near Las Vegas, Nev., with 107 cowboys and falling down over a gopher hole.

The circumstances under which this came about are rather complicated and need not be repeated. Suffice to say that some rather weird things go on in the advertising business.

In telling me of his discovery, the adman stressed the importance of having the right number of cowboys.

Plan Urges End to Quotas, Allotments

SALEM (UPI) — Delegates to the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation convention here have approved a wheat and feed grain program calling for an end to acreage allotments and marketing quotas.

The program was a compromise offered by a three-man committee appointed by president Harold Beach after a deadlock developed Tuesday.

Committed chairman Ralph Robinson of Union County said the compromise is now embodied in a bill being considered by a congressional committee.

It uses optional price supports and land diversion payments as incentives for farmers who are unwilling to gamble on selling their crops on the open market.

The deadlock Tuesday was over a resolution calling on the government to halt all control over agriculture. Robinson and other Eastern Oregon wheat ranchers opposed that stand.
