Charter To Be Presented To New Delphian Chapter

On the fortieth anniversary of the founding of the first Medford Delphian Chapter a new generation of Delphians will receive a charter from the national organization for a new chapter when they meet in Girls Community Club, at 10 a.m., Friday, December 6, to elect officers for the coming year.

Mrs. Albert B. Schwab, membership chairman, explains the object as mental stimulation and growth, because "whatever we do, we shall do better with better minds." Believing that all parts of the brain are brought into play in a spontaneous exchange of views, members twice a month engage in a 90-minute session for a free and spontaneous exchange of ideas. In the interest of spontaneity prepared talks, notes and papers are not used. Every member takes part, but no one may talk more than three minutes.

A different member serves as chairman for each session. To keep conversation to the point, she follows a discussion guide which contains the provocative questions on the basic fact and theory supplied in advance of the meeting to the members.

The subjects for discussion have been selected to help the individual to do a better job as a person, as a wife or mother, and as a citizen. They are correlated from three connected areas of knowledge: psychological, for new interpretations of personality, environment and hereditary factors; individual and family relationships; political, for a survey of the ways people in different nations conduct their social life, earn a living, govern or are governed; anthropological, for a comparison of the behaviors of people who live in diverse societies of the world.

Difference between fact and theory and opinion is emphasized.

Delphian is nonpolitical, nonsectarian, and prohibits chapters from engaging in controversial issues. Members think together without thinking alike.

The Medford Chapter, as part of an Oregon statewide organization, will become affiliated with the Portland Assembly of Delphian Chapters, which is one of the oldest Delphian organizations in the United States.

Although the governments of these developing countries are attempting to solve their literacy problems in ways best suited to their people, they have few facilities and face difficulties they cannot surmount without help, Mrs. Arnold said. Through CARE, American women will provide educational material to be used in conjunction with adult literacy and primary programs under the direction of trained teachers.

Mrs. John L. Mansfield is program chairman. She has arranged for club members to be stationed in the United States National Bank and the First National Bank, Thursday and Friday, November 21 and 22, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., to accept "contributions toward this vital effort to provide basic educational supplies to thousands of men, women and children, who would otherwise not learn to read and write for lack of paper, pencils, or even blackboards."

Mrs. Elizabeth Settle, of Travel Study Club, is chairman for a CARE tea to be held Tuesday, November 26, from 2 to 4 p.m. in the fireplace room in the Girls Community Club. There will be speakers from these countries. Mrs. Hoyt Hay will provide music.

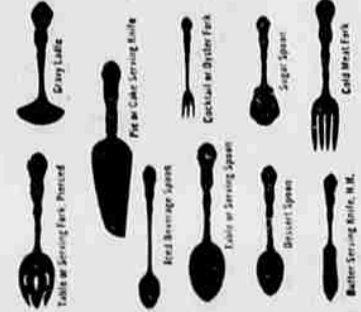
