A junior garden club section for gift ideas also will be included, officers have announced. Exhibits may be taken to the auditorium from 9 to 11:30 a. m., Thursday, November 21. Show hours will be from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. A silver tea also will be held.

The public as well as all interested garden club members are invited to exhibit and to attend.

Mrs. Gaston Floux, show chairman, outlined the classes and arrangements for the show of all-dry material during a recent meeting of the club. All materials must be treated dried, or preserved in some manner. Fresh plant material is not permitted. Artificial flow-

ers also cannot be used but artificial fruit may be used. Mrs. Floux stated that this is the only show of its kind held in the area.

Classes include arrangements for Christmas Time, Thanksgiving Time, Any Time, Candlelight (using handmade candles with an arrangement); Nature's Whimsies (weathered wood or other unusual natural material as part of an arrangement); pictures and plaques, swags and wreaths. Suitable accessories may be used with any class.
