

Episcopalians Urged to Withdraw from Automobile Association

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Episcopalians have been urged to withdraw their patronage of the American Automobile Association (AAA) because of alleged discrimination in providing travel accommodations for its Negro members.

The Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity (ESCRU) closed its three-day meeting here last week with a resolution charging that "segregation and discrimination are being fostered knowingly or unknowingly" by the AAA's acceptance of motels and hotels which practice segregation.

Church of the United States. A spokesman for the AAA said that the association had no control over the patronage policies of its approved motels and hotels.

ization does not discriminate in its membership or travel routing. "We have always felt that the patronage policies of our approved listings is a matter of private concern to the management," he added.

Several Negro delegates at the ESCRU meeting said that the AAA's approved accommodations listed many segregated lodgings. Others complained that they were unable to travel in parts of the South due to a lack of Negro accommodations.

Each resolution urged greater activity by church members and officials in supporting the civil rights movement. One resolution called for more "direct action protests" against any Episcopal Church, school or church-related schools "known to operate under discriminatory policies or practices."

Angry Legislator Scissors Paycheck

SALEM (UPI)—One legislator, angered because his colleagues refused to allow a bill to cut lawmakers' salaries to be voted upon in the House, took the matter in his own hands Wednesday. Rep. Edward Elder, R-Engene, jumped to his feet during debate on the pay cut issue and said "I guess I want my pay cut, I'll have to do it myself." He then took a pair of scissors and cut his expense check apart, and threw the pieces on the floor.

The self-styled economy move may not prove much of a saving, however.

The state treasurer's office said the check would be carried on the state's books for seven years, and at the end of that time if it was not presented for payment, the secretary of state would advertise that the check was to be cancelled.

Officials were unable to estimate what it would cost to write off the check.
