

# Riggs, McGarity, Gellert, Lucas 2-Way Choices on Rogue All-Star

Four players were named to both the offensive and defensive teams in the Rogue League football all-star selections made by the head coaches of the eight member schools.

The four were John Riggs, Henley High School; Gary McGarity, Phoenix; John Lucas, St. Mary's, and Darryl Gellert, Illinois Valley.

Riggs and McGarity were named tackles on both units. Lucas was named at guard and Gellert at offensive quarterback and defensive halfback.

Second place Illinois Valley dominated the offensive crew with five of the 14 players chosen. League champion and state finalist Phoenix had five of the 12 defensive players.

Phoenix and Henley placed three each on the offensive club. St. Mary's two and Eagle Point one. On defense there were two each chosen from Illinois Valley, Henley and St. Mary's. One Rogue River player was selected.

Phoenix, which will meet North Catholic on the coming week end for the state Class A-2 title, had seven individual players picked. A total of six are from Illinois Valley.

## Nebraska Captures Orange Bowl Berth

One Orange and a Tangerine have already been picked but a lot of ripe fruit in the form of lucrative bowl bids remains to be divided as spoils among the nation's major college football powers this week.

Nebraska thrashed Oklahoma, 29-20, on Saturday to nail down an Orange Bowl bid and Western Kentucky accepted a berth in the Tangerine Bowl immediately after crushing Murray State, 50-0.

But most of the "bowl deciding" games as well as conference championship contests were postponed due to the death of President Kennedy, and have been rescheduled for this week.

The situation is as easy as pumpkin pie in the Big Ten where fourth-ranked Michigan State and eighth-ranked Illinois square off on Thanksgiving Day with the league title and Rose Bowl trip at stake. The winner goes, the loser stays, and in the event of a tie, the Spartans get the nod.

Up For Grabs  
The other berth at Pasadena's Rose garden will be decided Saturday when Washington hosts Washington St. and Southern Cal tangles with rival UCLA. Should the Huskies whip State, they will get the nod. A Washington loss would throw the Big Six into a frenzy with even State in the running for the bowl bid.

Texas, which has already mapped its cattle drive to the Cotton Bowl, meets arch-rival Texas A&M on Thursday with mostly prestige on the line. The Longhorns, top-ranked in the country, are aiming for their first undefeated, untied season in some 40 years.

Third-ranked Mississippi can complete its annual travel plans for the Sugar Bowl by whipping Mississippi State in one of the formidable "family feuds" scheduled for the Saturday. The Rebels can wrap up the Southeastern Conference title with a win to the winner of the Alabama-Auburn clash. Auburn defeated Florida State, 21-15 Saturday.

The Pentagon must decide this week if the football spectacular of the year, the Army-Navy game, will go on as scheduled Saturday. The second

ranked Middles, with the brilliant Roger Staubach at quarterback, will probably go to the Cotton Bowl opposite Texas if they beat Army. If not, they will go nowhere.

Florida Tops Miami  
In feature games last weekend, Florida shattered Miami, 27-21; Tennessee stumped Kentucky, 19-0; Louisiana State zeroed Tulane, 20-0; Vanderbilt scored its first win of the season with a 31-0 spanking of George Washington; Arkansas bested Texas Tech, 27-20; and Utah upset Utah State, 25-23.

Ohio U. blanked Marshall, 17-0, to capture the Mid-America Conference crown but the Ivy League and Atlantic Coast Conferences won't be settled until this week.

Ivy leader Princeton faces Dartmouth while runnerup Harvard observes its "traditional" with Yale on Saturday. Duke and North Carolina slug it out on Thanksgiving with the winner gaining a final tie with North Carolina State in the ACC.

Other major contests to be held Thanksgiving include Wisconsin at Minnesota, Clemson at South Carolina, Virginia at Maryland, Furman at West Virginia and Notre Dame plays Syracuse in New York.

## Adrian Smith Sparks Royals

Because of a difficult schedule it will be hard for the surging Sun Devils to match last year's impressive 26-3 record, but Wulke's charges have a wealth of returning talent to make the Devils prohibitive favorites to represent the area in post-season play-offs.

Biggest Challenge  
Arizona State's biggest challenge is expected to come from two neighboring schools in the southern sector of the Rocky Mountains and Southwest—University of Arizona and New Mexico.

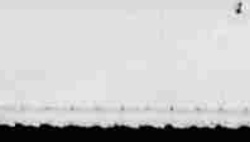
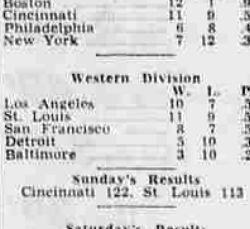
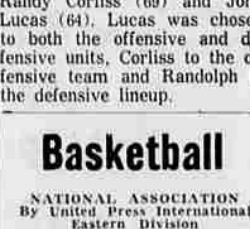
While Arizona State is expected to dominate the western athletic conference, two little schools who have gone big time are the favorites in the newly organized Big Sky Conference.

Weber State College of Ogden, Utah, a former national junior college champion, and Idaho State, for years ruler of the Rocky Mountain Conference, are co-favorites in the Big Sky loop. The league is made up of teams in Utah, Idaho, Montana and Washington State.

Among the independents, Utah State, Colorado State University and the Air Force are expected to fight for top honors and challenge affiliated Arizona State for regional supremacy.

In the little Rocky Mountain loop, Western State of Colorado and Adams State are the co-favorites.

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## Rex Baxter Wins Cajun

LAFAYETTE, La. (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus' disappointment over his failure to win the \$20,000 Cajun Classic golf tournament was tempered today with the knowledge that he is the second man in golf history to win \$100,000 in one year.

Nicklaus joined Arnold Palmer in that class Sunday when his fifth-place finish in the Cajun earned him \$1,050 and "put him over the top." Nicklaus finished with a pair of 69s in Sunday's rounds but had fallen too far behind to catch the leaders.

The tournament was won by Rex Baxter, Jr., of Amarillo, Tex., with a 13-under-par 275. He came through with a 34-68 in the final round to beat Bob Shave of Portland, Ore., by two strokes. Shave had a final round 34-35-69 for a 277.

Jack Rule Jr., of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Tommy Aaron of Gainesville, Ga., tied for third with 278s.
