LONDON (UPI) — British poet laureate John Masefield today published a poem entitled "John Fitzgerald Kennedy."

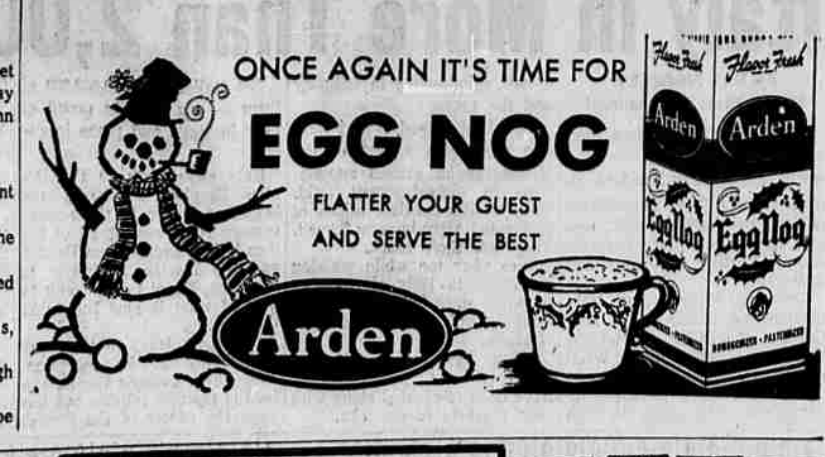
The tribute read: "All generous hearts lament the leader killed. 'The young chief with the smile, the radiant face, 'The winning way that turned a wondrous race

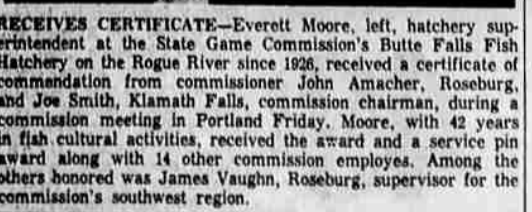
