State A-2 Grid Crown at Stake Saturday Afternoon at Ashland In Phoenix-North Catholic Game

PHOENIX — Oregon's high school football season comes to climactic conclusion this Saturday afternoon with the feature attraction of the day on Fuller Field at Southern Oregon College in Ashland.

Phoenix High's Pirates, who have rampaged on a trail of gridiron plunder through the season, are hosts to the North Catholic Royals of Portland, who have cut a wide swath of triumph also through the fall.

Kickoff will be at 1:30 p.m. Oregon's Class A-2 championship will be at stake.

This titular skirmish matches unbeaten and untied teams which have weathered two rounds of playoff opposition after gaining top-ranked recognition in the state. Sparkling high-geared, potent offenses and tough, sinewy defenses, manned by talented performers have carried the Pirates and the Royals each to 11 victories this fall.

Phoenix goes into the A-2 finale for the second time in three seasons. The Buccaneers, state playoff participants for five straight campaigns, were state co-champs with Myrtle Point in 1961. They want to claim the whole crown this fall.

North Catholic, a young school, fast building a fine athletic reputation, is in the grid championship eliminations for the first time this year.

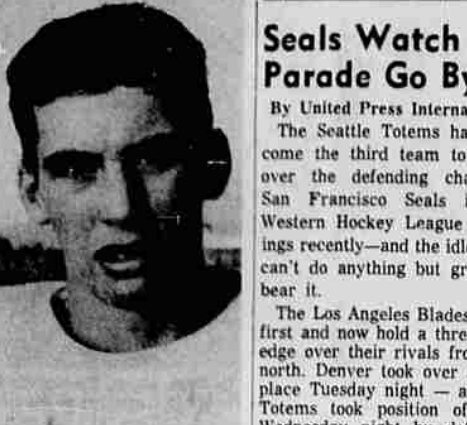
The Pirates carry the banner of Southern, Central and Eastern Oregon. Oregon's coastal area, the Willamette Valley and the state's northern fringe are represented by the Royals.

Phoenix has been listed favorite on the strength of its No. 1 rating through the season and its verdict last week over Vale, ranked No. 2 and 3 in two polls. Still, North Catholic has a tremendous season record which cannot be overlooked. And, there is no means of direct comparison between the Pirates and the Royals. The metropolitan team was, itself, ranked No. 2 in one final A-2 poll and No. 3 in two others. And, there's strong speculation that the North Catholic club is being underrated so far as its battle with Phoenix is concerned.

Royals Score 338
 The Royals, in sweeping to the Cowapa League championship and battling through the quarter and semifinals, have rolled up 338 points while yielding 39. Six teams scored one of their more than one touchdowns.

Phoenix in taking two pre-league tangles, surging through the Rogue league and winning two playoff frays, has recorded 58 touchdowns and 36 extra counters for 384 points. The Pirates have yielded just one touchdown this fall.

Phoenix will field first team all-stars in Halfback Jim Consruck, Tackle Ron Patterson (named at guard) and Fullback and End Jon Granby (picked at end). Guard Dave Westfall and Tackle Gary McGarity were fifth team choices for the Pirates.

North also had state all-star picks in Halfback Mike Hryciw (second team) and Tackles Dennis Schafer and Bill Klein (in the third).

Team statistics show that Phoenix has run up 2,746 rushing yards this fall and 598 passing for 3,344 net scrimmage total. To the opposition the Pirates have allowed 1,436 yards net with 552 on the ground and 884 in the air.

1,036 On Ground
 Consruck had led the Bucs in rushing with 1,036 yards in 157 carries for an average of 6.6 yards per try. Dennis Grennan has 538 yards for 128 carries, Granby 409 for 85, Williams 246 for 44 and Dale Sauer 232 for 34. Sauer's average is 6.8.

Williams has 499 yards passing on 26 completions in 57 throws.

Wilt Sinks 18 Straight Field Goals

 Wilt Chamberlain missed the first shot he took Wednesday night, then calmly sank the next 18 in a row to set a National Basketball Association record and the New York Knicks on their ears.

Chamberlain's record-breaking performance of 18 straight field goals wiped out the previous mark of 13 in a row by Larry Costello of Syracuse two years ago and paced the San Francisco Warriors to an easy 118-89 win over the Knicks.

Although he sat out the entire fourth quarter, Wilt scored 38 points and pulled down 14 rebounds. He and Guy Rodgers teamed up to break the game open in the second period, Chamberlain scoring 24 points and Rodgers registering 11 assists.

Worst Licking
 The Boston Celtics handed the Los Angeles Lakers their worst licking of the season, 114-78, for their sixth straight victory and 13th in 14 starts this season.

Sam Jones led all scorers with 20 points while a hard-pressing Celtic defense held Jerry West to 16 points and Elgin Baylor to 13.

Oscar Robertson led a second-half rally that enabled the Cincinnati Royals to overcome a 14-point deficit and beat the Baltimore Bullets, 122-119.

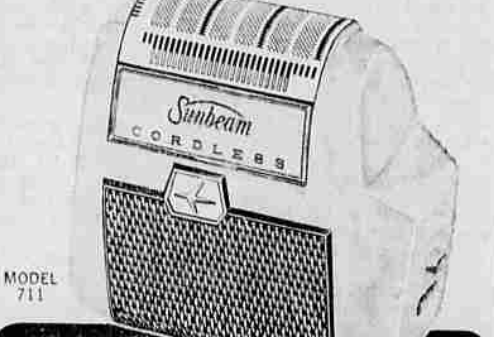
