SALEM (UPI) —The assassination of President John F. Kennedy changes the character of next spring's Oregon presidential primary.

The May 15 primary could be the most significant pre-convention election in the nation.

There will be much political maneuvering in Oregon in the months ahead.

The Democrats will have to fight harder to keep the lead they have — and the Republicans will fight harder because their chances of winning the White House seem improved.

The result is that the Oregon voter is going to be courted as never before.

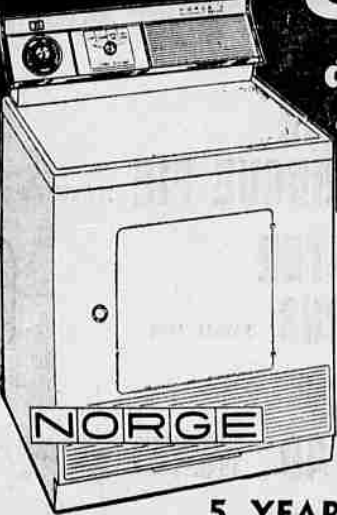
