OSAA Redistricting Committee Asked To Form New Plan

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Oregon School Activities Association's redistricting committee was ordered Friday to prepare a new plan for dividing high schools for athletic competition.

The action by the OSAA's Delegate Assembly grew out of a proposed constitutional amendment which would raise the maximum enrollment for a class B school from 150 to 200. That plan failed for lack of votes.

The redistricting committee is scheduled to report back at a special meeting in April.

Persol Seeks Fight With Eddie Cotton NEW YORK (UPI) — Unbeaten Johnny Persol, Brooklyn's substitute light heavyweight, asked today for a fight with top-ranking Eddie Cotton as a reward for Friday night's upset unanimous decision over ninth-rated Allen Thomas.

Persol, a professional for only 11 months, registered his 10th straight victory in his first 10-round, his first main event at Madison Square Garden and his first nationally televised fight.

Persol, a 125-pounder, weighed 174½ to Thomas' 172½, and he was given an 11½ vote of confidence by a poll of ring-side writers at the finish. And the three ring officials favored him, 5-41, 7-3, 8-22. It was Thomas' third defeat in 23 fights.

Huskies Win Big Six Race, Batter Cougars, 16 to 0

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—All coast fullback Junior Coffey hulled over two touchdowns Saturday to lead Washington to a 16-0 victory over Washington State, give the Huskies undisputed possession of the Big Six championship, and make them the likely West Coast representative in the Rose Bowl.

Coffey, who had been demoted to the second string after a disappointing performance against UCLA two weeks ago, scored on a four yard plunge in the second period and a three yard smash in the final quarter.

Washington State's Clarence Williams scooped up the ball on his own three and raced 97 yards for nothing. The ball had been whistled dead.

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—The City of Seattle let out a deep sigh, Jim Owens responded with a whoop and a jig on local television and the word was made official — Washington's Huskies are traveling to the Rose Bowl to play Illinois on New Year's Day.

The Huskies knew they must beat the Washington State Cougars to have any chance at a bid for the coveted post season game, and they responded with a gruelling and muddy 16-0 victory. Some of the 10,000 students in the stands relaxed with a "Rose Bowl celebration" immediately after the game, but everyone knew nothing was official until the Big Six office in San Francisco put its rubber stamp on the invitation.

It was a nervous two hours for the football fans in Seattle, and pessimists began assuring their friends that Southern California's 26-6 win over U.C.L.A. had given the nod to the Trojans.

Washington Coach Jim Owens got the word directly from Big Six executive director Tom Hamilton by phone while the Husky head man was being in-

terviewed on a local television program. "Congratulations on a fine game," said Hamilton.

"Oh, gosh! Don't keep me hanging any longer," gasped Owens.

Hamilton then began, "It gives me great pleasure to announce that the University of Washington..."

That was as far as he got. Owens let out a whoop, dropped the phone and did a fancy jig for the local television viewers. His face lit up like a kid who had just found what he'd always wanted under the Christmas tree.
