Baked Bologna New Dinner Dish

Here's an easy, economical dinner suggestion that will add new appeal to an old favorite, bologna.

To prepare, place whole bologna in a shallow pan. Leave skin on but pierce it well all way around with a fork. Surround with canned sweet potatoes. Pour a 10-ounce bottle of Mandarin Sauce, a tangy new sauce with the flavor of sweet peppers and pineapple juice recently introduced, evenly over bologna and potatoes. Bake at 225 degrees until heated through. Baste bologna frequently with sauce.
