Coordinate Table, Window Decorations For Holiday Season

Handy do-it-yourselfers can capitalize on the festive air of the holiday season by coordinating gay table setting ideas and window treatments.

A small, round table is the perfect foil for a floor-length Christmas cloth. Make one of bright red or green cotton and trim with white swag-and-ball fringe around the bottom using a narrow zigzag stitch. Make cushions for the dining chairs in stylized Christmas tree shape, trim trees with fabric covered buttons in contrasting colors so that they look like flat Christmas tree balls.

Singer sewing experts suggest you make a paper pattern of free before cutting fabric which you can also use to make extra trees to paste on your window shades, add some ball fringe to the shade border and multi-colored flat buttons to the trees, and — for a little time and effort — and very little money — you'll have a delightful spot to entertain Santa.

Give your bathroom an elegant holiday air by having your towels and window shades brightly decorated with amusing Christmas motifs.

Christmas bells, holly leaves, candy canes, or decorative candles are all easy to silhouette. Cut the appliques out of washable fabric in colors that lend a pretty contrast to your towels and applique with a zigzag stitch, add several rows of decorative stitch patterns to design to give your towels a special, custom look to complete your color scheme, paste one set of appliques on your window shade and cover a waste basket with towel and trim with ball fringe. Artificial holly shade pulls will add still another imaginative fillip.
