Human Relations Discussed by Panel for Club

Enforced integration can be as objectionable as enforced segregation. This view was expressed before the Medford Rotary Club here Tuesday by members of a panel discussing "Human Relations in the Rogue Valley."

The panel, headed by the Rev. R. W. Tuill, representing the Medford Human Rights Council, included Jack Creager, C. O. Lovejoy and Lester Harris. William G. Johnston was moderator.

The racial problem in the Rogue River Valley is inevitable, panel members felt, and already progress has been made in this almost 100 per cent white community in recognizing adjustments that must be made. The fact that concerned citizens here are facing up to the problem is evidenced by the formation of the local Human Rights Council.

The panel discussion, held at the Rogue Valley Country Club, revealed that progress has been made in schools here to do away with the concept of second rate citizenship. It was generally felt that equal opportunity for employment must be assured for people of all races, creeds, color and national origin.

Those who participated in the panel talks recognized that educational opportunities must likewise be assured so that Negroes might be qualified for equality in employment.

There have been examples here of Negroes not being accepted by the community, one panel member pointed out. More will come and it is wise now to examine ourselves as to our attitude to Negroes and become well informed now concerning the laws of Oregon and the Nation. In schools, in business and in neighborhoods, the question must be asked "who is he, not what is he."

He is unrelated to Dennis L. Samples, 20, of 3492 Bursell Rd., Medford, who is in jail on charges of larceny.

Due to the fact that the two names are almost identical have caused him to receive abusive telephone calls, bills he has not incurred, and other unpleasantnesses.

He asked the Mail Tribune to point out that there are two men with the same name, but there is no connection between them.

(Coincidentally, two members of the Mail Tribune news staff in the past have had similar experiences.)

Bellview Water Situation Discussed by Ashland Council

ASHLAND — The Bellview water situation was the principal subject for study and discussion at last night's Ashland City Council meeting here.

City Attorney Harry Skerry reviewed the problems of annexation, which all agreed would be a costly project. He presented a proposed ordinance which would furnish water to Bellview residents on property adjoining the city.

It would allow hookups for existing single-family residences, where a water main is already installed, at a cost of \$250. Each unauthorized hookup which now exists would have to be paid for at the same rate.

This proposal came following a new request from Mrs. David W. Hagerbaumer, 200 Crowson Road, who has been asking for water service for nearly two years. Last night she protested, in a letter, the granting of water service to the Oak Knoll area without annexation.

Santa Claus Will Answer Letters

Santa Claus is going to acknowledge all the letters he receives at the North Pole from children in the United States this year, Al Bradford, acting Medford postmaster, has announced.

Bradford called attention to this fact to let children of the Rogue River Valley know they will hear from Santa Claus if they write to him.

Cards, postmarked "North Pole Branch, U.S. Post Office," will be sent out to all persons who write to Santa. To facilitate delivery of the mail Santa Claus is asking that all children use their zip code numbers on their return addresses. Santa Claus' zip code number is 99701.

Any family needs expressed in letters to Santa will be referred to the Salvation Army, which is acting as clearing house for all organizations planning to supply food baskets to needy families, Bradford said.

Officer Candidate Pay Boost Noted

All U. S. Navy officer candidates will be advanced in pay grade effective March 1, 1964, according to Chief Ed Hawkins, recruiter in charge of the local Navy recruiting branch station. This will be for all candidates in training at Newport, R.I., and Pensacola, Fla.

The pay raise means an additional \$59.44 per month for all college graduates who apply and are selected for the U. S. Navy's Officer Candidate School in Newport or the Aviation Officer Candidate School in Pensacola.
